It is a good thing that there should be muslin curtains over the windows -but what would the head of the home say to a plumber called in to repair the waterworks who should undertake to regulate the curtains?

As long as we allow perfect liberty of conscience and of worship, so long we shall have to confess that the Protestant Bible is to the Romanist a Protestant religious book, and, as such, not justly to be imposed upon his children in the public schools.
