COCHRAN'S EXTRA PAY! THOMAS E. COCHRAN, the Opposition candidate for Auditor General, once represented York county in the Senate of Pennsylvania. During the session of 1839, when he was a member, the Legislature adjourned without passing an important bill, and the Guvernor of the Commonwealth re-sessimiled that body on the day following its adjournment. Meeting at the appointed time under the call of the Executive, the Legislature adjourned from the 17th of April until the 12th May, taking a recess, and returning to their homes, for a period of twenty-five days.— When the body again met, they remained in extra session until the 12th of June; and derng that session the members voted to themselves pay, not only for the extra session, but also for the recess of twenty-five days whilst they were at home attending to their own business. Although Mr. Coultran voted against he resolution giving pay for the recess, yet, notwithstanding his berois remonstrat when the bill was passed, he quietly received he full salary, and rockered the insult."-The following letter from the Chief Clerk of the Treasury Department, written and published when he was a candidate for re-clea-tion in 1840, fully establishes this fact, which is not "known to every one:"
