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Governor's Message. EXECUTIVE CHAMBER, HARRISBURG, April 9, 1861. TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA.

As the period fixed for the adjournment of the Legislature is rapidly approaching, I feel constrained by a sense of duty to call your attention to the condition of the military organization of this State...

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Proclamation of the President Calling Out Seventy-Five Thousand Men to Defend the Union. An Extra Session of Congress Convened.

WASHINGTON, April 14.—The following proclamation has been put forth by the President, to be published to-morrow morning:

WHEREAS the laws of the United States have been for some time past and now are opposed, and the execution thereof obstructed, evaded, and defied, in many particulars...

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Virginia Convention. RICHMOND, April 15.—The commissioners appointed to visit Washington presented President Lincoln's reply to the convention to-day without comment...

The general opinion is that President Lincoln, having repudiated Virginia's efforts for a peaceful solution, she must now aid in defending the South.

The Governor will issue no proclamation till he receives an official copy of Lincoln's proclamation. He has received a notification of a requisition for three thousand men.

DEARBY, April 8.—About three hundred fugitive slaves, principally by way of Illinois, have passed through this point since Saturday, and large numbers are reported to be on the way...
