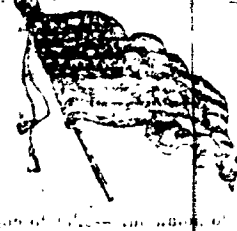

The New Union Party.

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The True Meaning.

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The Elections.

New York has gone largely for the 'People's Union' ticket, supported by three or four different factions. New York city is Democratic, electing a Democratic Sheriff, Treasurer, &c.

Massachusetts elects the Republican ticket, of course. The Republicans there felt quite secure in their own strength, and therefore did not resort to the 'Union' dodge. The cities and large towns, however, show a heavy Democratic vote.

New Jersey has gone Democratic. The returns are not all in, but sufficient have been received to make it certain that the Democrats will have a majority in both branches of the Legislature. The House is composed of 60 members, and the Senate of 21, as follows:

Maryland goes heavily for the 'Union' ticket. Bradford's majority for Governor in Baltimore is 14,000, out of 20,010 votes polled. Frederick county gives Bradford 3,022 majority, having majorities in every district but Emmitsburg, where Howard has 25 majority. Bradford's majority in Washington county is estimated at 2,000—

FROM THE NAVAL EXPEDITION.

Bombardment of Port Royal, S. C. Passengers by the steamer Louisiana, which arrived at Baltimore on Friday, from Old Point, bring a report that the Federal fleet had effected a bombardment of the Confederate fortification on that island.

There are said to be batteries on five islands commanding the entrance to Beaufort, which are to be reduced before the fleet can operate against the more formidable defenses which defend the town, which is 16 miles further up Broad river from Port Royal.
