Sigel's corps we have a report of a brilliant cavalry exploit on Sunday .-Brigadier-General Stahl attacked the enemy at Sniker's Ferry, and followed them with three hundred cavalry into their camps on the other side of the river and near Perrydirections, nearly all of the officers being captured, and ten colors taken. The Third, Seventh, and Twelfth Virginia Cavalry were also routed. Forty of their men were taken, and fifty killed and wounded. Two colors were captured from them .-Arms, ammunition, horses, and cattle, fell and fifteen wounded.
