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



"Hotels, inns, or taverns, and eating-houses, having taken out the license provided. therefor, shall not be required to pay any other license for the sale of any articles customarily furnished by hotels, inns, or tayerns, and eating-houses, and not prohibited by the laws of any State or Territory where the same may be located, or in violation tliercol."
