THE SIEGE OF CHARLESTON.

Night Attack by the Monitors-Heavy Fire Returned-Shelling the City with Greek Fire.

New York, August 27 .- The Arago, from Charleston bar on the 25th, (Tuesday,) has arrived. She brings the following disputches from the correspondent of the

American :

OPERATIONS ON SATURDAY NIGHT. OFF MORRIS ISLAND, August 24-Noon.-On Saturday, midnight, Admiral Dahlgren, with five Monitors, advanced in the dark-ness on Sumter, and beened fire at 3 o'clock, keeping it up until six. A dense for then arose, which shut out the fort from view. The fort, during five hours firing upon it was struck over one hundred times, the balls tearing through the sea walls and doubling the number of port-holes. The whole parapet was also carried away. No signals were given until the whole fleat opened, and then the fire was of the most verrific description. Sumter fired one gun in response live times, but Moultrie, Gregg and Beaureg and for three hours rained shell on the Monitors, but failed to do them any harm.

The Monitors were struck seven or eight times: no one injured. Sumter is defunct, and is now an immense pile of rubbish. The only gun left was thrown off the wall

MONDAY'S OPERATIONS. To day a grand naval and army attack on Forts Wagner and Gregg will be opened, it being now asceptained that Sumter is defunct, the rebels being driven from Morris
