A DRAFT FOR 500,000 MEN.

Executive Order, Feb. 1st, 1864. That all able-bodied male citizens of the United States, who have not served in the Army or Navy during this war, be drafted for military service.

WASHINGTON, January 30. The Draft Proclamation. The issuance to-day of the proclamation or notice for the five hundred thousand additional men to be drafted, in March, is being hailed with enthusiasm by the political and military circles.
