SPEECH

HON. JOHN L. DAWSON,

OF PENNSYLVANIA,
IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES,
FEBRUARY 24, 1864.

Mr. Speaker, it is now about eight years since I left this Hall. The country was then in the enjoyment of its unimpeded career of prosperity. It seemed as though, although the problem of government had been solved, and that human wisdom had found a way to solve the problem upon a basis of just and equal laws for individuals, and that the happy success for the rights and interests of the political community, which composed the Federation, was a thing of course, and that the great question of the time was not how to solve the problem, but how to solve it in the most efficient manner.

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
