### A Hard Case,

And a Man with no Conscience.- A negro woman named Rebecca Garret, and her six children, were taken from Baltimore, Maryland, about 18 months since, by Thomas Anderson, of Howard District who claimed them as slaves. The case was tried, and the court gave a verdict against Anderson. He carried it to the Court of Appeals, which has reversed the judgment of the County Court, on the ground that the law requires the issue of freedom to be tried where the master reides. The case will now be disposed of by the Howard District Court, where Mr. Anderson desired it to be tried from the first. It appears that the woman had been allowed by her mistress, the mother of Mrs. Anderson, to live as a free woman in Baltimore, where she married and resi ded for 21 years, and where the children she has were born to her by a free father.
