Lewisburg Newspapers. Some time since we gave a short history of the land titles in this Borough, and now proceed to give a brief history of the various newspapers that at different and short periods have been found a local habitation and a name.

Horrid Affair.—Last week we promised to give further particulars in regard to the difficulty between John Henry and George Hoffman, which resulted in the death of the former.

Death of Rev. Dr. Judson. Boston, Sept. 6.—Letters received by the Hibernia announce the death of Rev. Adoniram Judson, aged 63 years, on the 12th April, on board the French brig Arctide, bound to the Isle of Bourbon.

On the West Branch of the Schuylkill and its tributaries, from Minersville to Schuylkill Haven, although the flood was very considerable, the damage was comparatively trifling.

The probability is now that there will be no Coal sent by Canal from either Pottsville or Manahunk, for the balance of the season, and none by Railroad from here for at least two weeks to come.

At Tamaqua a man lost his wife and four children in the flood. She hid him far away from the window.

A woman was seen passing with the current with her head above water but fast between two logs. And another with a babe in her arms clinging to a bundle of hay.

Byard Taylor of the Tribune has won the \$200 prize for the best American song to be sung by Jenny Lind. There were nearly 700 competitors.

We understand that a young man, engaged in running a boat, by the name of Ralston, a brother of David Ralston of this Borough, was drowned at or near the Marsh Creek dam, on the Bald Eagle, on Sunday last.

Fatal Affair. On Saturday last a personal encounter took place between Mr. Asa Keeler, an old and well known citizen of Northumberland township, in this county, and Mr. Mathew Weaver, which resulted in the death of the latter.

The circumstances, as related to us, were briefly as follows: A political contention arose between them at the public house of Mr. Keeler, and both parties became greatly excited.
