We may here mention that the Journal is half completed, but the most interesting portion of it is yet to come.

A "Union Meeting" was held in the Court House at New Berlin, yesterday afternoon, Israel Gutelius, Esq., President, six Vice Presidents, and H. S. Boyer and Joseph Ellett, Secretaries.

Alexander Jordan, Esq., of Sunbury, delivered a lengthy, written speech; and was followed by Samuel Weirick and R. B. Barber, Esqs. Letters were read from Judge Pollock, and Hon. James Cooper, Mr. J. Seebold, chairman of the Committee appointed for the purpose, reported Resolutions in favor of the Compromise measures of the last Session of Congress; which were adopted, and copies directed to be sent to Messrs. Clay, Cass, Webster, Sturgeon, and Cooper, of the U. S. Senate.

We do not observe any measures of public interest perfected in either our National or State Legislatures. Those bodies are too apt to leave important measures to the hurry and uncertainty of the close of their sessions, and hence originate most of our objectionable laws and "Galplianina" appropriations.

We observe in our State Legislature a revival of the miserable quarrel between Bloomsburg and Danville. We hope for the sake of the State Treasury if not for State pride, that the Legislature will no longer be a party in the perpetuation of this profitless neighborhood strife.

Those who read the acts of Congress, often observe grants of land made to New States to aid them in works of public improvement. Mr. Casey recently proposed a similar appropriation to aid in the completion of important public works in Pennsylvania. The measure is so doubt not frustrated, but we can see no sufficient reason why the Old States should not have an equal share of the common domain won by their blood and their treasure.

We chronicle another dissolution of partnership this week. There will however be no diminution in the activity and energy heretofore displayed at the Lewisburg Foundry; and we hope the business talents of the retiring partner will not be long lost to our community.

The Voice of Union County. Scott and Johnston.

At a large and enthusiastic meeting of the Whigs of Union County, met at the Court House by call of the County Committee, Feb. 17.

M. H. TAGGART, of East Buffalo, was appointed Chairman, and H. H. MARGARITZ, Esq., J. FARNSWORTH, MICHAEL PERINS, Esq., and Wm. REICHEL, Assistants; and Charles Casley and Col. Wm. F. Wagensteller, Secretaries.

The following gentlemen were appointed a committee to draft resolutions: Wm. Van Gezer, Esq., R. V. B. Lincoln, Col. Wm. F. Wagensteller, Wm. McPherson, Geo. F. Miller, Hon. Ner Middlewarth, Wm. Johnson, Capt. John Wilt, and Peter Gray.

During the absence of the Committee, D. W. Woods, Esq., was called upon to address the meeting, and responded in an appropriate tribute to the memory of our late President, Gen. Taylor, and in encomiums upon the character and services of Pres. Fillmore, Gen. Scott, and Governor Johnston.

The Committee reported a series of Resolutions, which were read and adopted, unanimously.

[The first six resolutions are devoted to the value of the Union, the supremacy of the Laws, and the right of the People to alter and amend any law they may deem unwise or unjust. The next four take the common ground in favor of the Protective Tariff system, and against the Tariff of '46, particularly its ad valorem feature.]

Resolved that we have undiminished confidence in the ability, purity, and patriotism of our National and State Administration.

Resolved that we deem the present a fit occasion to present to our fellow citizens the name of Gen. WINFIELD SCOTT as our preference for the high and honorable position of President of these United States in 1852 and that his services as a Soldier and a Statesman, entitle him to the lasting gratitude of the American people, and are deserving of the highest honor in their gift.

Resolved that our able and patriotic Governor WM. F. JOHNSTON, by the establishment of the SINKING FUND for the reduction of our State Debt, and by the administration of the Executive Branch of the Government in a faithful and economical manner, has established for himself a high and enviable reputation as a Statesman, and has clearly developed a system by the operation of which our State may relieve herself of her enormous Debt, and our people of their Taxation.

Resolved that we are highly gratified to see Gen. BICKEL, the Democratic State Treasurer, bear honorable testimony in favor of the Sinking Fund system of Governor Johnston and its operations, in opposition to the unfounded and prejudiced attacks of the Democratic Union and other kindred prints.

Resolved that our Representative and Senatorial Delegates to the State Convention are hereby instructed to support the re-nomination of WM. F. JOHNSTON for Governor, and to use all honorable measures to secure that object.

Resolved that we view the calm and conciliatory measures of MILLARD FILLMORE, the President of the United States, as a signal illustration of his patriotic devotion to the Union, the whole Union, and nothing but the Union, and that he deserves the most heartfelt gratitude of every American citizen.

[The general course of Messrs. Cooper and Casey in Congress, and of Messrs. Cunningham and Slifer in the Legislature, was approved.]

Resolved that the course of the Hon. HENRY CLAY in the U. S. Senate, has put the climax to his fame as a Statesman, and he will go down to the grave lamented by every true American citizen without distinction of party.

Resolved that any diversity of difference of opinion that may have heretofore existed among the Whigs of Union County with regard to candidates for County officers and which may have caused any ill feelings among individual members of the party, and all individual and personal feelings, be and the same are hereby buried in oblivion, and henceforth will again unite in solid column and do battle in the GREAT WHIG CAUSE.

Col. A. K. WILDER, of Juniata County, was nominated on the part of Union County for Senatorial Delegate to the State Convention; and the appointment of THOMAS HAYES, Esq., as Representative Delegate, confirmed.

On motion, it was further Resolved that we recommend to those friendly to the nomination of Gen. SCOTT for the next President, to hold TWO CONVENTIONS on the 20 of August next, (the anniversary of the battle of Chancellorsville), those residing West of the Allegheny to meet in Pittsburg, and those East, to meet in Philadelphia.

Resolved that the Chair appoint TWO HUNDRED DELEGATES to attend the Convention recommended to be held in Philadelphia on the 20th of August next. [List to be made out hereafter.] Resolved that we recommend all the friends of Gen. Scott for next President, without distinction of party, to attend a meeting to be held in this place on the first Tuesday of next May Court. Adj.

Safety of the Atlantic.

The British Steamship Africa, Capt. Ryrie, arrived at West Point on Saturday evening, from Liverpool, which port she left on the 1st instant. She brings the gratifying intelligence of the safety of the Steamship Atlantic. This will prove joyful news to the many having friends on board; and we may add that the passengers of the Atlantic, leaving Liverpool on the 28th December, proceeded on her voyage until the 6th January, when in the midst of a fearful storm, the main shaft of the engine was broken, and she was completely disabled. The wind being from the northwest, rendered it impossible to steer for Halifax, as was Capt. West's first intention, and her course was set for Bermuda, but on the 12th, the wind coming round to the southwest, Capt. W. was determined to steer for a European port, and useless as were her engines, and only slightly adapted for sailing, she succeeded on the 22d in reaching the port of Queenstown in safety, after sailing over 1500 miles. A meeting of the passengers on board the steamer at which resolutions were passed, in testimony of the unwearied care of Capt. West and the other officers, in bringing the ship safely in the port.

Geo. Parosh, tried at West Chester for shooting Miss Sharpless, a school-teacher, has been found guilty of murder in the first degree. He is a nephew of Jabez Boyd, who was hung in that vicinity for the murder of a boy some years since.

The semi-annual interest upon the State Debt, amounting to \$949,274.27, was promptly paid in full on the 1st inst. at Philadelphia, and enough of it in the Treasury to meet all current demands.
