The bankers are running over with money, but it can not be obtained at less than eight per cent. per month, and on good security. Real estate bears a value relative to this state of things. Property bringing in a rent of \$400 per month, payable in advance can be bought for \$1500 to \$5000, cash, and I am advised of a number of transactions at these rates.

About half a dozen printing offices have arrived this week, and before Spring I predict they will be like lumber—sold for freight. Two establishments have been sent to San Jose, the Capital, one to Sacramento, and one to San Diego. However, this is a growing country, and newspapers are needed in all the towns of any importance in this State and Oregon. Two new papers are talked of in this city. One of them belongs to B. R. Backe, who has imported it at an expense of \$3,000.

The land titles here are getting badly mixed up. The Superior Court has decided that titles given by the town are null, and although a man may have purchased property from the town in good faith, yet the courts will give him no redress against a man who may have "equipped" you on the land. Possession is at least ten points of the law.

The State Bonds are at par, and war wants on the treasury, not bearing interest, bring seventy cents on the dollar, readily. The scrip issued by this city is at a heavy discount; at fifty cents it is a heavy seller than buyers.—[N. Y. Com. Adv.]
