Voted that the Treasurer be authorized to pay for books and stationery for use of the officers, and also for Certificates of Membership.

Winter Work.

MATERIALS FOR MAKING MANURE.—While the weather may remain open, the collecting and composting of materials for making manure should be the business of the farm.

FIREWOOD.—Amid yourself of every good day during this month, to have cut down, hauled in and piled up, a full supply of firewood to last you until the time next year; let your supply be such as that, come whatever severity of weather there may, it will be more ample; and be sure to have it hauled as early as possible, so that the labor to your beasts and hands may be the less burdensome.

WINTER PLOUGHING.—As we have often before told you, we now tell you again:—If you have any stiff clay fields that you intend to cultivate next spring, you would greatly improve their texture and capacity by ploughing them this winter. You should however, choose your time for such work. The ploughing of clays should never be performed when such lands are wet. The proper time to plough them, is when they are moderately moist.

STEARING AND SHEPHERD FOR CROCK.—Is your farm supplied with ample accommodations of this kind, to protect all your stock from the inclemencies of the winter—from its cold and pitiless rains—from its snows—from its halts and storms? If not, permit us, in the name of humanity, to ask you to erect them forthwith. Every generous feeling of the heart dictates that such accommodations should be provided, while labor—that would passion which, when it once takes possession, makes every thing else secondary to its tyrannical will.

denial true, that any animal which may be comfortably kept in a warm, dry, well ventilated apartment, can be supported upon one-fourth less food than can one that is exposed to the elements. The reason for this opinion, though sound and ample, we have not room now to state. If there be a farmer who can sleep with an undisturbed conscience, of a cold, wintry night, while his cattle are exposed to the angry and chilling blast of a winter season, we envy not his feelings.

YOUNG CATTLE.—Young cattle should always be kept in a separate yard to themselves. They should be provided with comfortable sheds, their roofs projecting sufficiently long to protect them from snows, rains and hail; each stall should be bedded with leaves or straw and cleaned out daily, so that they, the animals, may lie in comfort. Their sheds should face the south or south east, and open into a yard for exercise in good weather. They should be fed three times a day with hay or fodder of some kind and receive a feed of grain daily at night; oats is considered best for such purpose, though almost any grain will answer. The appointment of food should correspond with their ages. The great objects should be, to keep, at all times, the cravings of hunger from their stomachs—to give them enough to appease their appetites, and keep them in a healthily growing state. While we utterly repudiate the semi-starvation system of some, we are equally opposed to the stuffing plan of others.

WORKING HORSES AND OTHER WORKING ANIMALS.—All such animals should be kept in a moderately warm, well ventilated and airy stable, which should be kept sweet and clean—their food should be nutritious, and given them three times a day at regular hours; they should be watered as often, matted and rubbed down night and morning; be well bedded at night; the hinder part of each stall should be provided with a trough to receive the urine and convey it to a cistern outside the stable which should be kept nearly filled with manure, covered with plaster, the which, when perfectly saturated, should be removed to a shed near at hand, and, as deposited therein, should be sprinkled over with plaster, and over that an inch or so of manure should be placed. If the stalls are not thus provided, they should have plaster daily sprinkled over their hinder parts where the urine and dung falls.

AN APPLE SPECULATION.—Twenty-five hundred barrels of Newton pippins were as freight in the last European steamer. They cost five dollars per barrel; the freight charge is one dollar and twenty-five cents, and they are sold in Liverpool for twenty-eight shillings, or seventeen dollars per barrel. The expedition with which perishable merchandise of this description can be delivered, ensuring its good order, has given rise this season to an extensive traffic. As there are thousands of acres of wild lands in this State and New Jersey, which could be converted into apple orchards without much labor or expense, the raising of fruit for exportation at such prices would prove a profitable business. Indeed, the prices for domestic consumption of late years would bring a good profit.

Foreign News.

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—The United States mail steamer Arctic, from Liverpool, which was due on the 12th inst., arrived at her wharf this evening at 9 o'clock. Several fatal shipwrecks have occurred on the east coast of Scotland. Gold continued to pour into England, in large quantities, from Australia. There had been some excitement in Railway shares in London, and sales had been made at advanced rates. The Countess of Lovelace, the sole daughter of Lord Byron, died on Saturday.

The Paris journals are generally engrossed with election matters. The majority in favor of the Empire, will not fall short of eight millions. Louis Napoleon will undoubtedly be proclaimed Emperor the 11th, on the 2d inst. General de St. Arnaud, it is said, will be named Grand Marshal of France. The Chancellor of the Exchequer, it was expected, would bring forth his budget on Friday, giving a full statement of the financial condition of the country. A severe storm had occurred in several of the Departments, causing an immense destruction of property.

The Overland Mail has arrived with two weeks later advices from India, which report the capture of Prome, by the British troops, with but little loss on either side.
