Union County Whig Meeting.

Change of mode of making Homings.

Pursuant to the call of the Standing Committee, a very large number of the Whigs of Union county assembled in the Court Room on the 14th Dec. 1852, when

ROBERT H. LATHAM was chosen President; John F. Wilson, James Shields, John Wilt, Henry W. Snyder and Benjamin Cawley, Vice Presidents; and Jacob Hammill and Samuel Marshall, Secretaries.

The object of the meeting having been stated by D. W. Woods, Esq., Chairman of the Committee, George F. Miller, Esq., being called upon, proposed the following:

Court Week.

Up to Thursday noon, one case had been tried in the Common Pleas, an issue to try the validity of certain judgments of Jacob W. Smith dec'd, against John Hartman, Jr. Verdict against Smith's Administrators.

In the Quarter Sessions one case of Forcible and Bastardy from Hartley Tp., on which the Jury were out all night and half of the next day, and being unable to agree, were discharged by the Court. Also an indictment against Daniel Renger for an alleged obstruction of the road at the Buffalo X Roads, by moving his fence out into the road. Verdict—

There is still one other case in the Quarter Session, and three other issues about the Hartman judgments similar to the one already tried. These it is presumed will occupy the remnant of the week.

On Wednesday Gen. Wm. E. Packer, President of the Susquehanna Railroad Company, applied to the Court by petition, for a Rule on the County Commissioners to show cause why a writ of Mandamus should not issue requiring them to sign bonds for the amount of their subscription to that road. The rule is returnable to-day when a preliminary hearing will be had.

Judge Edwards, of the Court of Oyer and Terminer, New York City, passed sentence of death on four young men last Saturday, for murdering a man on board the ship Thomas Watson of Philadelphia, in August last. The oldest of the criminals is about 23 and the youngest 18 years of age.

A section boat, laden with between two and three hundred kegs of powder, caught fire last week at the foot of Plane 6, on the Portage Railroad. The explosion was an awful one, shattering everything near it, but fortunately without injury to human life, all the persons on the train having precipitately left the spot as soon as the fire was discovered.

BOSTON, Dec. 14.—The result of the Congressional election in Massachusetts yesterday, to fill vacancies is as follows: First District—Scudder, Whig, is elected. Second—Crocker, Whig. Third—Edmunds, Whig. Sixth—Upham, Whig. Seventh—Bangs, Coalitionist. Eighth—Wentworth, Whig. Ninth—Dewitt, Free Soil. Tenth—Dickinson, Whig. Eleventh—Goodrich, Whig.
