Barn-Yards.

H. B. Masser, Esq: When I visit my neighbors' barn yards and see what labor some of them have spent to keep their barn yards dry by having them to slope from the barn, so the washing of the stable manure, which lay exposed to the rain and sun, may pass off into sorue public road or running stream, I no longer wonder why they must annually heal their straw to Pettsville to obtair, money to pay their taxes. I have large and commodious sheds built on two sides of my barn vard, -my barn on the 31 side having an opening at the east er.d of the yard I have a large vat, made water tight, which will hold about twenty barrels; In to this my yard is drained, consequently I have a dry vard and receive the whole advantage of the juice and prine which collects in the vat. The vat is covered with plank, and under these sheds I have all the manure put as it is taken out of the stable, so that none of its fertilizing qualities are lost. In those sheds, it remains until my ground is in readiness, when it is hauled out and ploughed under as soon as possible. Liquid from the vat is hauled in casks, and ap-
