LIQUOR ON SUNDAY .- The "Sunbury American" states that the tavern keepers in that judicial district do not keep open houses, for the sale of liquors, on Sunday. Judge Jordan, and his associates, Judges Dentler and Weiser, are of opinion that a tavern keeper should not have any greater privilege in this respect than merchants, tradesmen and others, who are prohibited from selling any of their goods or wares on the Sabbath.
