CAPTURE OF JOAQUIN.—This celebrated murderer, we learn by the arrival of the Northern Light from California, has been captured and beheaded. A San Francisco paper says intelligence was received in that City from Quartzburg, that the notorious Joaquin, the freedbooter and murderer had at length been captured and killed, at the Pancho Pass, by a detachment of Captain Lovy's party, headed by Captain Burns. Joaquin's party consisted of six men, three of whom effected their escape. After a desperate resistance, and the fall of their leader, the other two were captured. Joaquin was beheaded, and the trophy preserved in spirits.

HEALTH OF MOBILE.—During the week ending the 20th inst., there were 57 deaths in Mobile, of which 32 were of yellow fever. For the forty-eight hours ending the 22d there were 5 additional fever deaths. The disease is said to be on the decline. At night tar is burned on all the streets. The big Wettempa, which sailed from Mobile a few days ago for New Orleans, was compelled to return, in consequence of the captain, mate and some of the crew having taken the fever.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 20.—The sum of \$5000 has been contributed in this city in aid of the sufferers at New Orleans, and transmitted to the Howard Association. Collections are still being made, and the sum will probably reach \$8000.

Foreign News.—The Europa arrived at Halifax on the 29th, with Liverpool dates to 20th inst. In Eastern affairs no change has taken place, since the announcement received, that the Porte accepts without modification the note prepared by the four powers, and already accepted by the Czar.

The long promised debates on Turkish affairs had taken place in Parliament, and were generally regarded as unsatisfactory. The English funds opened the next day with a further depression, although they afterward revived from other causes.

Lord John Russell stated, in reply to Lord Dudley Stuart, that the negotiations with the United States, regarding the Musquito Territory, were still pending, but he hoped they would be brought to a satisfactory termination ere next session.

Austria has addressed a memorandum to all the European Governments, showing that the recent affair at Smyrna is America's first step toward the realization of the Monroe doctrine.

From St. Petersburg, 5th inst., it is announced that Menechikov has declared the Cession coast, from Nara to Saklen Kale, in a state of blockade, to prevent the importation of arms from Smyrna.

Statistical Comparison.

Gov. Bigler, of California, comparing that State with others, says:—In horses she is in advance of fifteen of the States; in mules, of twenty-six States; in milk cows, of twelve States; in work oxen, of eight; in value of live stock, of twenty States; in wool, next to New York, and more than one-half of all produced in the Union; wheat, greater than ten of the States; oats, three-fourths of the other States; hay, exceeding nine of the States; mining, without parallel; fruits, exceeding all the States in variety, and one-half of them in quantity produced.

The Anti-Division Plan. [From the New Berlin "Star" of Feb. 1853.]

"There is a capital of \$108,529,208 employed in agriculture, real estate and improvements. Her mines are yielding at the rate of \$100,000,000 a year. From January to the 30th of May, 1853, there entered 487 vessels, of 249,633 tons, and cleared 756 vessels, of 272,245 tons.

In March, 1847, Yerba Buena (now San Francisco) contained about 150 mud and frame houses, and when Mr. Sample started the first newspaper, it was considered a poor venture, as it was said the place would not support one for the next twenty years."

The first house in St. Louis was erected in 1763. When the first census was taken, in 1820 the population was 5,500; in 1850 it was 82,500; and now, 1853, it numbers 95,000—the average increase being a fraction over 1,000 per annum since 1763, in which year the site of the city was selected by Laclade as a trading post.

Yellow Fever Specific.

L. Nevitt Steele, Esq., Charge d' Affairs of the United States at Venezuela, has addressed the Department of State in reference to a plant indigenous in the vicinity of Caracas, which has been found to be a specific for the yellow fever.

The plant is known in the South American flora as the "Verbena Braziliensis," and is spoken of by Humboldt as the "Verbena Caracasana." It is probable that the plant already exists in the United States, but if not, it may be readily cultivated in the Southern States. Mr. Steele has forwarded a package of the seed, a part of which the Secretary of State has placed in the hand of the government horticulturist at Washington, and the remainder has been forwarded to a distinguished gentleman connected with the Medical University at New Orleans. If the plant possesses the eminent mechanical virtues ascribed to it, its introduction in our medicinal materia is a matter of first importance.

Choose between the Plans!

Since new County buildings must soon be made, the Divisionists propose that the towns having the benefits of Courts, &c., shall pay the first cost.
