Water Works.

Since the disastrous fire in Lewisburg, our citizens have had their thoughts turned to the construction of Water Works, not only to supply the town with an abundant fountain of pure soft water at all times, but also to furnish a guard against the ravages of fire. A fire removed from the River, in immediate contiguity with other buildings, under such headway as that of Saturday night, would have swept away whole blocks, for the want of water to check it. A fountain with hose and pipes, is the most sure, reasonable, and economical preparation for fire.

A Charter for the Lewisburg Water Company, was procured from the Legislature, last session. A correct copy of the act, is in our possession. We invite the determined and prompt attention of our fellow citizens to this important matter. Our town is becoming so large and so compactly built, that we can not longer hope to be exempt from outbreaks of fire; to take measures to prevent its extension, is certainly the part of wisdom, and may in a measure be made sure.

MR. CHRISTOPHER SEEBOLD complains bitterly that he was misrepresented at this end of the county. We say, if he was, it was his own fault. The people would have been glad to know if he was in favor of rebuilding a Court House in New Berlin? This information he declined giving; but instead of that—the real issue—the volunteered the following Card against future Improvements in general, and in favor of Repudiating the contract of this County with the Susq<sup>a</sup> Railroad in particular. It is true that Mr. Seebold did not write the above; it was prepared for him by the New Berlin clique; but he signed it, and became thereby justly responsible for its sentiments.

We stated, the week prior to the Election, that we could not guess what scheme the New Berlin Juniors would devise to stave off the Division issue. The scheme is now apparent. It was to issue tickets, as follows:

"Bonds and Division.

Against the Railroad Bonds—Against the Division."

These tickets were circulated in the Anti-Railroad Districts, the morning of the Election, and the people were told that if they voted against Division they could get rid of the Railroad! and with that belief more or less operating, nearly two-fifths of the vote of the county was cast (informally) against the Railroad. They were voted on the same slip with the Division tickets, contrary to the recommendation of the half of one Convention only which recommended it; and being entirely unauthorized, and having no legal force, the Board of Return Judges refused to receive them, and they were not counted by the Clerks. They might as well vote whether Geo. Heimbach should have been elected Commissioner, as to vote upon a contract which has passed.
