All the Railroads.

The only important item of Railroad news we have to note this week, is the transfer of the Sunbury & Erie Railroad between Williamsport and Milton to the Catawissa Company, for a period of twenty years! New York capitalists furnishing the money to complete that link, and to have the use and control of the road for that period, unless sooner reimbursed for their expenditures. This makes that portion of the road a feeder for New York, (via Catawissa and Easton), instead of Philadelphia; and the movements of the confederate speculators who have had the management of the Sunbury & Erie, have only resulted in throwing that enterprise, so far as it has a tangible existence, into the hands of Philadelphia's most dreaded rival!

The Charter of the Susquehanna Company prohibits discriminations against Philadelphia trade; and if it had been permitted to complete their road to Williamsport at the outset, and operations commenced on the S. & E. at Williamsport and pushed westward to Erie, according to Ex-President Miller's public pledge to the citizens of this place, some senseless litigation would have been saved, co-operation and not hostility would have been the beneficial law of their progress, and the grading and masonry between Sunbury and Erie would have been more than half finished by this time. As it is, the late managers of the S. & E. have demolished themselves and surrendered their fragment of a road to Eastern rivals, without deterring seriously retarding the Susquehanna road. We understand resignations have been made in the Directorship of the S. & E. Company, so as to give Philadelphia city the control of the road for the present, and induce if possible a restoration of the But this proposition does not seem, as yet, to meet much favor from the City Councils.

Having thus cheaply obtained access to the trade and travel of the North and N. W., the Catawissa company, and the shrewd New York capitalist who are the power behind the throne, are turning their attention again to their W. and S. W. connections, and a delegation headed by Col. Paxton was in our town last week, to look after the Spruce Creek Railroad, and the indications in its favor are now decidedly flattering.

Williamsport & Erie Railroad.

We believe a Company is chartered to build a railway from Williamsport, which will be the terminus of the Susq. road, to the Harbor on Lake Erie. Since the only graded portion of the S. & E. road has been disposed of to the Catawissa, it has been proposed that the remaining franchises of the Sunbury & Erie Company be conveyed to the Williamsport & Erie Co., on condition that the latter organize and execute the work in a given time. A new company, unembarrassed by former misunderstandings, would have more public confidence; and Baltimore, Philadelphia, and New York—and all the Railroads entering there—would be greatly benefited by the completion of the Road.

Its importance to the State, and the section through which it would pass, has not been overrated—We ask the attention of the Press to the proposition.
