The Revenue Commissioners are in session at Harrisburg.

The Dog Ordinance in Lewisburg, is about as much honored as the Small Note Law.

There is no immediate prospect of opening the North and West Branch Canals for spring navigation.

The Gandy's Lane Rioters were found guilty at the late Court, and sentenced to a few weeks' imprisonment.

A subscription for the Spruce Creek Road was started in Lewisburg yesterday, and between 80 and 100 shares taken at once. Pass it around.

A dog supposed to be mad recently passed through Sunbury, biting several other dogs before it could be killed. The bitten dogs were promptly shot by their owners.

It is announced that every Northern Whig will vote against the Nullification of the Missouri Compromise, and it is said several Southern Whigs and Democrats will also vote against it.

At the adjourned Democratic Convention of Union county, on Monday, PHILIP HILMISH, Esq., of Chapman, was unanimously elected Representative Delegate, instructed for Bigler and Black. On Canal Commissioner the vote stood—Mott 22, Sherwood 16.

The New Berliners are advocating a Railroad from the Susquehanna Road to Lewistown through New Berlin. So it would seem the ring-leaders of Reputation in that town expect and desire the completion of the Susq. Road, after all!

Petitions for the Division of Union county are again in circulation. By dishonestly mixing that with a sham railroad issue, the opponents of Division last fall had 181 majority. Then there were polled for Division in White Deer, Kelly, and Buffalo Twp., only 206 votes; now, over six hundred voters in those three townships have petitioned for Division.

The Danville papers make a strong plea for the establishment of a National Foundry at that place. Sunbury claims that the biggest guns could there be cast at the least expense. Williamsport represents Ralston as the most advantageous location. But when Uncle Sam concludes to set up a Workshop in Central Pennsylvania, he will doubtless "compromise" all conflicting interests by settling upon Lewisburg as, upon the whole, the most eligible site.

We are informed that the Star establishment at New Berlin is about to pass into the hands of a stranger, from the eastern part of the State. A number of prominent Whigs from different sections of the county, tired of the abusive and disorganizing course of that sheet, frankly informed its nominal editors that they must sell out, or a genuine Whig paper—disconnected from all cliques, and neutral on merely local questions—would be established forthwith. They wisely selected the former alternative...and the gallant Whig party of old Union—over Three Thousand strong—will we trust again have a reliable, faithful, prudent, impartial and able organ.

The Democratic Convention of Allegheny denounced the Nebraska movement. The Democrats of Bradford, Susquehanna, and Wayne, have opposed it by public meetings. A Democratic meeting was held in Harrisburg, C. C. RAWNS, President, which, after a free discussion, condemned the Bill by a vote of 7 to 1.

Per contra, John Swinsford sprung a resolution of approval of the Bill, and got it passed, at the convention at New Berlin on Monday last. We do not believe that the farmers or mechanics composing the mass of the Democracy of Union county would approve of the extension of an evil which would shut out their hardy sons and daughters from a territory six times as large as the State of Pennsylvania!

The Pennsylvania U. S. Senators disagree on the Nebraska question. Mr. Cooper—raised in a Slave State—opposes the Douglas bill. Mr. BRODHEAD—a native of the land of Penn., of Franklin, of Independence Hall—supports it. Which Senator represents Pennsylvania, it is not difficult to tell. Her history, and the unbiased voice of her people (aside from petty partisan maneuvers) are uniformly on the side of Liberty. Her free, hard-working citizens love Peace, but they hate a system which legalizes Oppression.

Senator Douglas holds slaves in the right of his wife. Senator Bright owns married in Kentucky. Senator Brodhead married in Mississippi. How many more nominal Northern Senators are allied to the Slave interest, who can tell?
