The Lancaster Examiner, thinks argument a good one, and very justly remarks that all these are as essentially valuable, as food, as the wheat itself; and for fattening, much more so, the oil of wheat residing in the bran; whole giving only about 1 per cent. of fatty matter, or oil. But the ash of bran consists chiefly of phosphate of magnesia, a very valuable salt both in food and as manure; while it is one of the rarest in the seil, one of the most expensive to restore, and without which wheat can not come to maturity.




