**REVIVALS**—Last month, 18 persons were added to the German Reformed Ch. in New Berlin, and 14 to the Presbyterian Ch. on Sunday last.

We think we have seen quite recently, in divers papers, a statement that "Winter lingers in the lap of Spring," with various and multiplied comments. About this time, there is too much reality in the atmosphere, to be poetical.

**RE-INAGURATION**—On the 4th of May next, the New York Crystal Palace will be re-opened, and probably remain a permanent Institution of Gotham. It has heretofore been a losing operation to the Company itself, but citizens of New York have come forward and taken thousands of Tickets to assist the generous originators in maintaining it as a public good. P. T. Barnum is now President of the Association.

THOMAS HART BENTON has given a mauling to Bill Nebraska, which some think will knock out what life remains in him. We purpose copying it in our next. It is of especial importance, coming from the man elected by Missouri to the U. S. Senate after the passage of the Missouri Compromise—under which compromise he has ever since acted and represented that State in Congress—thirty-three or four years. It is also important as coming from the oldest Congressman on the stage. The many and frank sentiments of Mr. B. (a Southerner and slave-holder) contrast gloriously with the time-serving and truckling lick-spitties of Slavery at the North, who would allow the curse of Slavery to extend over millions of free soil, if they could thereby get a few crumbs from the Government table.

The last New Berlin memorial to the Legislature boasted of its mail facilities as superior to those of Lewisburg and (we believe) Selinsgrove! Lewisburg and Selinsgrove have Telegraphs, and daily mails—Lewisburg a daily mail every week day and every other day two, besides weekly and tri-weekly mails, while the "great metropolis" has we believe a daily mail only every other day—that is, three days a week she gets Philadelphia news in 24 hours by Northumberland, and in 48 hours by Lewistown—and no Telegraph. Great town, that, for news, as well as coal and iron and other luxuries.

But the New Berlin paper don't seem to have learned yet that the *euse is changed* for the New Berlin Heimbach prosecutions, from Union to Lycoming county. (We are told the money raised has been expended to prevent Division!) They will probably keep that fact from the honest but doped people, some of whom they expect will come to New Berlin (as they did last Court) to see the Bonds given up, as the Times and other New Berliners circulated through the county!

**STAGE ACCIDENT AND LOSS OF LIFE**—On Thursday evening last, as the Potts-ville & Bloomsburg Mail Coach, with four horses and eleven passengers, were descending the embankment of the Fishing creek Bridge, two miles below Bloomsburg, the break gave way, the horses ran off, and upset the Coach against the fence, by which a passenger named William H. Tracy, was instantly killed. He was a single man, about 44 years of age, formerly a citizen of Palmyra, N. Y. An inquest was held on the body, by E. Q. Painter.—*Columbus Democrat.*

Flour and Grain continue in active request, with large sales of flour to-day at \$20.50 for 50 bushels, and 100 bushels at \$20.80.

The offerings of Wheat and Corn are small. Sales of the morning of White Wheat at \$20.50 per bushel; Red 1.98 to 2.00; Rye 1.04; Corn 7.80 to 8.00.

The price of Pennsylvania Wheat thus far this season have been exceedingly small, although prices have frequently ruled higher than in Philadelphia. The whole number of boats which have found their way to this city, since the Canal opened is about 200.
