Court has been rather thinly attended this week. But little Commonwealth business. The case of Reaney, Neefe & Co., vs Culbertson and others, was on trial, and we understand resulted in verdict for PIF. of \$400.

After a long-protracted struggle, the lower House of Congress has resolved to cut off all further discussion on the Nebraska bill at noon of to-morrow, (Saturday); and all the powers of the Administration are devoted to the passage of the Bill. It is feared that it will pass, notwithstanding the wide-spread disaffection and pointed condemnation of the people.
