He is an ecclesiastical millionarie, removable at the pleasure of a foreign potentate, unconnected by family ties with the community in which he lives, and whose only desire in life is to swell the power of the Church which never dies, and which persues its plans of aggrandisement through centuries of sleepless action. To guard against the control of our cities by men who are at heart hostile to free institutions, is a solemn duty. Much can be effected by steadily voting against the can lidates they patronise, and by the passage of general laws against accumulation, in single hands, of property for ecclesiastical purposes. 


