It is thought Simonton has 1500 maj. in Union, while Crawford has 800 maj. in Juniata.

Governor.—Lewisburg 174, Kelly 102, East Buffalo 80, Hartley 45, Limestone 22, Buffalo 71, White Deer 62, Union 9, Washington 11, Perry 40 and Selinsgrove 5, for Pollock.

New Berlin 15, Jackson 28, Millburg 15, for Bigler.

Beaver, West Beaver, Franklin, Centre, Middlebrook and Penas give Pollock 500 additional majority.

Congress.—Returns imperfect, but it is believed that Kunkle will have about 1200 majority in this county, and 2500 in the District.

Senator.—Very few votes returned for this office. We suppose Sellers has 1200 majority in this county, Millin gives him a majority also, and Juniata a few against him.

Register & Recorder.—Lewisburg 400, Kelly 62, Millburg 29, Selinsgrove 200, East Buffalo 106, Washington 20, maj. for Pennington—said to be elected.

Commissioner.—Half-penny runs about with Pennington in the north end of the county, but Mr. German having received the Division vote on the south side, Mr. Romig (Anti Division Whig) is probably elected.

Auditor.—No opposition to John Schreck.

Reported Majorities.

The "Know Nothing" vote was thrown for Pollock, Whig, Mott, democrat, and Baird, native. Pollock, Mott, and Black doubtless elected, Pollock by 25,000, and Mott by a still larger vote.

PROHIBITION.—The vote on this question came in very slow.

Union Co. Lewisburg 322 maj., East Buffalo, 17 maj., New Berlin, a maj., and Millburg 80 for the Law. Union 42, Buffalo 64, Limestone 72, against. Probably a large majority against it in the County. (Selinsgrove 60 for the law.)

Northernland Co. Milton, a handsome maj. for the Law; Chillisquaque, 12 against. We are informed that the County has gone for the Law.

Centre Co. Gregg tp., for the law; Potter tp., a tie; Penns and Haines, against.

Philadelphia, 6000 maj. for the Law. Luzerne, 1000 maj. for the Law.

Northernland county gives Pollock about 500, Black and Mott about 700, Dent 850 (but Schuykill defeats him.) Yorks defeats Montgomery 400, Weis (whig) defeats Reader for Sheriff, Rens (Prohibition) elected Commissioner, and even our clever friend Youngman of the Gazette is defeated for Auditor by a "Know Nothing" Shindle!

Lycoming, Clifton, Centre, Perry, elect independent, Anti-Nebraska men, as far as our returns indicate, throughout.

CONGRESSMEN.—We have intelligence of the election of Florence, Dem, Nebraska, from local influences in Philadelphia, but of none others of that stripe, in the State.

Tyson, Millard, Broome, Jones, Bradshaw, Stewart, Fuller, Campbell, Kunkle, Pearce, Todd—all Anti-Nebraska—are supposed to be elected.

Division Triumphant!

The contest is over, and the Division party have achieved a signal and decisive victory. The puerile personalities and wholesale falsehoods, which, in the absence of solid facts and manly argument, formed the whole stock-in-trade of the anti-division party, have recoiled with retributive vengeance upon their own heads, and left them prostrate on the field of battle, crushed out and annihilated.

JAMES M. SELLERS and Dr. CRAWFORD are elected by triumphant majorities; and next winter Maj. JOHN W. SIMONTON, the illustrious, will be in better business than standing up at Harrisburg, in a representative capacity, impudently asserting that his constituents and their positions have no business there! Irrelevant side-issues, and a cross-fire of contradictory, eleventh-hour falsehoods on the Liquor question, helped to keep him on his legs a little longer in some districts, but could not save him from disastrous and remediless defeat. The vote of his own township shows how completely he had lost the confidence, and forfeited the support, of those who know best, and furnishes about the best epitaph we know of to inscribe on his political tomb stone.

Lyidature.—We have not sufficient indications to determine the complexion of either branch of the Legislature. Our party—the Independents—have been doing a "smashing" business.

It is strongly suspected in certain quarters, that the defeat of Mr. Bonham and several other gentlemen, was owing to the lack of sufficiently long and pointed "addresses" against the "Know Nothing".

Ohio Election.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 10.—The election passed off very quietly in this city to-day. It is concluded on all hands that the American Reform ticket is elected in this city and county by a majority of 5,500. The indications are that this is a fair index of the result in the State.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 10.—Edward Wade, Free Soil, is probably re-elected in the 10th Congressional District, by 4,000 majority. The Anti Nebraska ticket in this city will have about 1000 majority.

NEWARK, N. J.—Municipal election to-day, October 10th, 1854, about 6000 votes polled. Horace J. Pomer, Whig & Know Nothing, elected Mayor, and all the tickets.

COLUMBIA, Oct. 10.—Mordick, who is charged with being a Know Nothing, has been elected Senator from Charleston. The Hon. John I. Preston has been elected Senator from this district.

BANNER TOWNS.—Lewisburg gives 350 votes for the Prohibitory Liquor Law—against. Any town with licensed hotels that can poll a stronger proportionate vote than that, will please mention it.

At a recent election for Mayor in Nashville, Tenn., two candidates were running, each positive of his own election; but when the votes were counted, they found themselves 936 votes behind a new opponent, who had not been heard of by them before.

A Whig Know Nothing Mayor was elected in Baltimore, on the 11th inst., by a majority of over 2,000.

California Election.

The election on the 6th Sept. resulted in the choice of Messrs. Deurer and Herbert, Anti-Broderick Democrats, for Congress. The Legislature has a majority of the two factions of the Democracy, but it is doubtful whether they can unite upon a U. S. Senator. In San Francisco, the Know Nothings carried everything before them, 29 candidates being Whig and Anti-Broderick, and 7 K.N.s only. Every man was elected, some having 4,000 majority. The new Common Council is composed of 12 Whigs and 4 Democrats.

Professor Morse is said to have discovered the skeleton of a mastodon near Poughkeepsie, and is now at work excavating it. It is spoken of as the most perfect specimen ever yet found. The bones are partially perfected.

The Madison (Indiana) Banner says Martin Roberts, who resides on the river some six miles below Madison, in Kentucky, informs us that he has a hog that weighs upwards of nineteen hundred pounds, which he has sold for two hundred dollars.

POTTSVILLE, Oct. 10.—A very large fire is now raging here in the rear of Centre street. Many buildings are on fire as I send off this despatch—9 P. M. All the buildings in the rear of the Miner's Journal office, and all along the Railroad street are on fire. The Office of Miner's Journal—Published by Benjamin Bannan—and many other buildings are destroyed.

A BIGAMY CASE.—A charge of bigamy has been heard before the Henrico county (Va.) Justices, in which Benjamin F. Prentiss, who has resided for ten years in that neighborhood, has been charged with marrying Miss Melena N. Minturn, having been previously married to Miss Mary Hunter, in the town of Lewistown, Millin county, Pennsylvania, now a resident of Petersburg, and for a time a resident of Milton.
