description of the soil and climate of

Minnesota :] It has a very rich soil, which yields abondant crops of wheat, corn, outs, potatoes, beans, pumpkins, turnips, carrots, beets, and every thing else usually raised in Penusylvania and New York. It is of a dark sandy beam, generally speaking, with a large intermixture of disintegrated magnesian limestone, a very fertilizing material. This soil is warm and genial, easily wrought, free from stone, and brings vegetation forward with great rapidity. It is much less subject to early and late frosts than the more clayey soil of Ohio, or than the hard rocky fields of New England, though farther North. It has therefore happened that people leaving New England after the fall frosts had destroyed all garden vines, and arriving here, have found every thing of the kind fresh, green and untouched.
