In the spring of 1850 a party of white men amounting to about forty, were seen traveling southward, over the ice, and dragging boats with them, by some Esquimaux Indians, who were killing scals on the north shore of King William's Land, which is a large island, usmed "Keliktak' by the Esquimaux. None of the party could speak the native language intelligibly, but by signs the natives were made to understand that their ships had been erashed by ice, and that the whites were now going to where they expected to find deer to shoot. From the appearance of the men, all of whom, except chief officer, looked thin, they were supposed to be getting short of provisions, and they purchased a seal from the natives.


