**MORE SLAVE TERRITORY.**—It will be remembered by many of our readers, that during the last session of Congress, a scheme was introduced in the Senate, by the Hon. Robert W. Johnson, one of the Arkansas Senators, to organize a new territory between the 34th and 37th degrees of latitude, and the 94th and 100th degrees of longitude, embracing a tract of land of about 43,000,000 acres, lying between the Red River in Louisiana and the southern boundary of Kansas, to be called Neosho. The bill providing for the organization of such a territory was introduced by Senator Johnson near the close of the last session, and has been made an early order for consideration at the present session. The Editor of the *Western Home Visitor*, an Ohio Journal, having examined the scheme and made himself familiar with the provisions of the bill, denounces it strongly as another stealthy but formidable project of the Slave power against the cause of Human Freedom. He denounces the bill as being actually so drawn as to prohibit any law excluding Slave labor from the soil of the territory being passed, and if his views are correct, it is certainly a project which deserves more general attention than it has yet received.

**Life of Horace Greeley.**—We are indebted to *Mason Brothers*, 23 Park Row, New York, for an early copy of this work. It was written by James Parton, entirely without the aid, knowledge, or interest of Mr. Greeley, and makes a handsome volume of 442 pages. The author does not coincide in all the opinions of his hero, but he does him a man not surpassed in his influence upon the public mind, and also as a model of imitation in industry, thoughtfulness, benevolence, and public spirit. His 23 years' residence in New York, is identified with some of the most important events in our national history.

But we glean three personal traits from this interesting work, which should be copied by every boy, youth, and young man. 1. Mr. Greeley's early opportunities were limited: living in a retired hamlet, his only school was the district; his father, bankrupted, was driven from one poor farm in New Hampshire to another in Vermont; his earliest years were familiar with poverty, and extreme hard work, which he counteracted cheerfully and manfully; yet, by using all the spare time he had, in studying, and seeking information from every source, he laid the foundations for usefulness and eminence. 2. Notwithstanding the universal prevalence of the custom, and although he boarded in hotels during most of his apprenticeship, he very early in life took a decided stand against the use of intoxicating drinks and of tobacco, which he has maintained until this day. 3. His filial respect and devotion were peculiar. From his slender earnings as a printer's apprentice, he saved many dollars to aid his parents in their struggles to maintain a family of younger children. At the close of seven months' journey work in Erie, he had expended only six dollars on his person; he took thirteen dollars with which to start to New York city, and commence the world to better advantage, and left his last earnings to his father; nor did he stop, until his parents were secured with a good farm (in Erie Co., Pa.) improved with buildings, implements, and stock of the best—As to the public deeds and doctrines of Horace Greeley, are they not to be read in the *New York, Log Cabin, American Laborer, Whig Almanac, Tribune, &c. &c.?*

**Foreign News.**—The steamer *Union* arrived at New York on Saturday. There has been no more fighting and no material changes in the aspect of affairs. Confidence was rising in England. Wooden barracks for 20,000 men have been shipped to the Crimea, indicating a winter campaign. All the marine force that England can muster has been engaged to carry reinforcements, &c., to the seat of war.

The battle of the 5th appears to have made both sides cautious. It has stopped the serious operations of the Allies, and the Russians, not being so hardy pressed with the siege, are waiting, and maturing their plans for another assault upon the Allies. Both parties are receiving reinforcements. As soon as either party feels itself strong enough to begin operations again we shall have more battles to announce, and more slaughter to record. The obstinate defence of Sebastopol has evidently raised the Russians and their military skill in the estimation of the Allies, and will induce them to set more cautiously and more certainly in future. Prince Napoleon has left his command in consequence of an attack of dysentery, and returned to Constantinople.—*Pottstown Ledger.*

**Through to the Lakes.**—The Directors of the Cattaraugus, Williamsport & Erie Railroad laid Monday resolved to open the road from Milton to Williamsport on the 26th of December. This will complete the last link in the chain that will connect Philadelphia with the Western lakes, and open a new avenue for trade and travel. From that day Philadelphia will be ten miles nearer to Erie than is the city of New York, and will receive a larger share of business from the West. The distance from Philadelphia to Milton is 109 miles. From Milton to Williamsport, the distance is 284 miles. At that point the Williamsport & Elmira Railroad connects with Elmira which is 75 miles distant. At Elmira the New York & Erie Railroad connects, and makes the whole distance from Philadelphia to Erie 511 miles.—*Bloomburg Star.*
