

Fan with a Judge. The Chronicle of the 15th inst., has a notice of the charge of Hon. James M. Porter, to the Grand Jury of Wayne county, supposed to squint with both eyes right front the Know Nothings. Now as it happened that, during the Anti-Masonic era of 1835, Judge Porter was one of the very men who "knew Nothing" of the secrets of Masonry when he was required to testify in relation thereto, so twenty of the Grand Jury be addressed in 1851 were "Know Nothings," and had nothing upon the American party. Accordingly, no presentment appeared, and the "charge" was a decided water-haul. But the Honorable Democrat, not having the fear of anything before its eyes, and being moved and instigated thereto by the fan of the thing, got up a supposed indictment to meet the case, a few sections of which we copy, as follows:

"And the Inquest aforesaid, do further present, That the said Know Nothings, combining, conspiring, and confederating, as aforesaid, in the year 1853, commenced their attack upon the venerable usages of the said democratic party, and by virtue of said conspiracy and by all their dark insidious wiles, did delude the people and cause the defeat of a most worthy democrat who had been regularly nominated as President Judge." And in 1854, in pursuance of said conspiracy, did defame the said William Bigler of his office of Governor, and did defame all the worthy nominees of the democratic party in the county of Wayne. And it is currently reported and believed that they intend, in the name and under the guise of Americanism, to turn out of office all foreigners, and to put in their places American citizens, and to overturn Popery and such like superstitions and establish Protestantism and civilization in their stead, and to cause that the laws for naturalization be amended and the time for becoming citizens be extended. All of which said actions, doings, plottings, and conspirings are most manifestly to the contempt of the constitution, the great and sore affliction of the democratic party, and so to be denounced, presented, and most cordially punished.

And the Inquest aforesaid do further present that said Know Nothings, holding the sentiments aforesaid, are justly exposed to condign punishment, and, if there were not so many of them, ought to be banished by the Honorable Court to Botany Bay, or the State of New York, or any place where they could not endanger the peace and harmony of the democratic party of Wayne county, or defeat regular nominations.

And so the Inquest do present these said Know Nothings, in conformity to the rules of Law and Policy, as a pest, a plague, a political nuisance, to be abated at the ballot box; if not, then we must leave them to the disposal of the Honorable Court."
