News Items from Other Counties.

COLUMBIA.—The Powder Mill of Warden & Campbell, located in Scott township, took fire and burned down, on Tuesday week. Loss not over \$200. The machinery was saved.

BLAIR.—W. Henry Snyder, of Lewisburg, has established a newspaper at Altoona. On Sunday last, the roof of the Presbyterian Church in Hollidaysburg caught fire from the stove pipe. It was quenched immediately by the people who were just collecting to attend services. Damages very slight.

CENTER.—"Sam," it is stated, carried every Boro' and Township except Haines. —The Chippewa chief, Maungaudun, lectured in the M. E. Church, Bellefonte, to much satisfaction.

LYCOMING.—The Jersey Shore Republican, after noticing the old story, newly revamped, of "William Morgan being found" somewhere, says "If the Masons have *dead* to do with as a compensation for his meanness, we do not censure them."
 The 22d was celebrated at Dickinson. A large number of paintings, compositions, and original declamations, to a crowded house.—The Lycoming Teachers' Association has been held.—One John Lovejoy was fined \$7.50, and sent to jail in Williamsport for two days, for profanity and disorderly conduct.—The dwelling of Mr. Criswell on Pine street, caught fire from a heater in the cellar, but was extinguished before the engines arrived.—The *Press* urges John W. Maynard, Esq., for the U. S. Senate.—Mr. John Becker, one of the hands employed at the Muncy Mills, had his right hand accidentally caught between two cog-wheels, and so badly mutilated that it is feared amputation is necessary.

Early last Sunday morning, an unfinished building belonging to Mr. Charles Narber, in Muncy Creek township, caught fire from the kitchen fire-place, where the carpenters had kept up fire to work by during the winter, and was entirely destroyed. The loss is about \$1400—no insurance.—The young men's Philanthropic Society, of Muncy, intend giving an exhibition on the first of April.—James W. Clark is associated with Theo. Wright in the publication of the *Lycoming Gazette*.—A Protracted Meeting has been in progress during the last week at the Second Presbyterian Ch., Wmsport, and many converts been added.

NORTHUMBERLAND.—Some scoundrel took advantage of the night to deface the pulpit of the new German Reformed Church, Sunbury.—The Borough Fathers of Sunbury publish an ordinance against allowing mules and goats to run at large.—The Miltonian states that the Railroad between Sunbury and Milton will be proceeded with immediately, and anticipates a large amount of Shamokin Coal shipped North.—The Milton Democrat states that Senator Faggett misrepresents his constituents in opposing Gen. Cameron; and the Sunbury Gazette of course applauds him for his stand.

PERRY.—The address of Daniel Gantt, Esq., before the Educational Convention, is published.

MONROE.—The Columbia Guards, Capt. George W. Forrest, paraded on the 22d ult.—Richard Young, aged 92, died in Danville last month.—The Concert given by Prof. Bullard's Singing Class, was a very creditable and delightful entertainment.

MILTON.—The Public Schools of Lewisburg number 520 pupils, and an average attendance of 417.—The Lewisburg Furnace has blown out, in consequence of the want of a market for iron.

DAUPHIN.—Gov. Pollock has appointed Jacob Shope, of Hummelstown, prothonotary, in place of Stephen Miller, rotated to be Flour Inspector.—Harrisburg has enjoyed the benefit of some good Public Lecturers.—Solomon Snyder and one or two accomplices attempted to kidnap a colored boy, but were foiled, and the villain is in jail for the offence.—On Monday last, the picking room of the Cotton Mill in Harrisburg was consumed by fire. Loss to the Company, about \$10,000. It will be rebuilt in a few weeks.

SUSQUEHANNA.—Mr. Howard, aged about 70 years, a resident of Bridgewater, while attending a township election, fell dead in a bar-room. He had not been drinking.

CLEARFIELD.—A short time since, Abraham Roles and his brother, and another person, when in the woods hunting, separated, and two of them tracking a deer into a thicket, where Abraham had just entered, the other brother seeing something move in the laurel, fired, and killed his elder brother!—A large meeting of the citizens of the county favorable to the construction of the Tyrone, Clearfield and Erie Railroad was held in the Court House on the evening of the 20th ult.

The Teachers of Perry and Washington townships, Union county, held a Public Meeting at the Freeburg Academy, 10th ult.—D. S. Boyer, President, and H. W. Roush, Sec'y. A commendable spirit of improvement in the profession, was evinced. They adjourned to meet to-morrow evening.

We learn by the New Berlin *Frog*, that the County Superintendent, Mr. Whitman, is performing his duty in that region. The *Star* has an able and timely editorial on the subject of the complaints made against County Superintendents, and very properly urges that if reasonable salaries were paid those officers, no just ground of objection to the system could be found.
