Steamship Causda from Liverpool, with dates to the 18th 'inst., arrived here at 4 o'clock, this morning.

The Russian army under Liprandi had attacked the lines of the Allies at Teberhaya on the morning of the 16th, and after a battle which lasted three hours were repulsed by the French and Sardinians with a reported less of 5,000, and 400 Prisoners.
