The allegation of Mifflinburg is, FIRST, that County Commissioners have the power to subscribe stock to Railroad Companies. This is false as a general thing, and we have repeatedly defied them to show one word of Law for their assertion. The power of Counties to aid in constructing Railroads by lending their credit, is a special grant of power by the Legislature ; and not a general power.

The Legislature did grant power to several counties, to take stock in the Sunbuty & Erie and Susquehanna Railways. The former is now completed, along the opposite side of the river, and there is no desire, wish, or expectation, on the part of any one in Union county to take stock in it, for it is finished to our purpose. .

The Susquehanna Railroad Company died by being merged with the Central Railway Company, and before so doing surrendered back all its Bonds from Corporations, which we suppose were cancelled.

There is therefore no power-we again take one dollar of stock in the Spruce Creck or Northern Central Railway com. ing to do good. panies. They can not do it if they would.

Nothing is more easy, thanks to the numerous exhibitions, there is scarcely a neighborhood that has not one or more breeders of good stock, generally willing to part with some

of their surplus birds at moderate prices.

It can scarcely be doubted that the best stock for table purposes is the Dorking; the varieties have been mentioned before in these pages. These who wish to breed a very large bird should procure the light grey or speckled kinds; those who wish o have a moderate plump bird may get the Silver Grey variety, sometimes known as "Lord Hill's breed." These birds are to their larger brethren what the Southdown sheep is to the Leicester, and other larger varieties, and they have one advantage to the fancier, viz., that they breed true to color which the larger birds do not, and there are few things more agreeable in poultry keeping than a yard filled with evenly-marked birds, all alike; but what ever breeding stock may be decided upon, no poultry keeper who wants eggs should be without Cochin or Brahma pullets : as winter layers they are invaluable, and produce a constant supply when fresh eggs stripped thus in the earlier part of the command a high price. > STACKING CORNSTALKS .- A correspondent of the Roston Cultivator has tried various methods of curing his corn stalks, but without satisfactory success.
