Thus it will be seen that this division of Union county polled more votes this year than the whole county did 19 years ago.

Last week's Star promised to issue no "handbills in favor of Millinburg." The usual issue day of that paper, is Thursday; but on Monday of this week the Star arose—itsself a "handbill in favor of Millinburg"—and was scattered broadcast throughout the county, (a very convenient way of "whipping the old fellow around a stump.")

And last Monday's Star has up as the "Whig candidate for Canal Commissioner, Joseph Henderson, Esq., of Washington county."

Now we thought everybody outside of that remarkably serene and "central" ancient metropolis No. 2, was aware that Mr. Henderson had ten days previously declined, and was not the Whig candidate.

"I see things are thickening up all around you, and with the troubles in Mexico, and Denmark, and Kansas, and the melting down and mixing up of about 15 political parties all over the country and running them into thirty new months, you must have your hands full, and will need all your friends to stick by you; and I assure you I am not the man to desert an Administration so long as I hold an office under it."

HUNTING A TRUNK.—A few days since a middle-aged woman called at station No. 1, Boston, very anxious to find her trunk, because as she alleged, it contained her character. An officer interested himself in the matter and finally succeeded in finding the missing trunk. The Trustees of the Bank of the United States made their final dividend on the 28th of September, 1855, when the Institution ceased to exist. It has taken fourteen years to wind up its affairs. The assets realized were insufficient to pay the creditors of the Bank, so that the loss to the stockholders was total.

BALTIMORE, Oct. 10, 9 P. M.—The municipal election to-day resulted in the choice of eight Americans and twelve Democrats, being a gain of six Democrats over last. The Democrats have about 1000 majority on the popular vote. The Americans had a majority of 2700 last year.

TRIAL OF ARNISON.—The court at Cincinnati has decided that Arison, the "infernal machine" murderer, can be tried a second time. The case will be taken up on the 4th of December next.

Foreign News.

HAMLEAK, Oct. 9.—The Canada, Capt. Stone, from Liverpool on the 29th ult., arrived here at 7.

Active operations have been resumed in the Crimea. The Grand Duke Constantine arrived at Nicalsoff on the 29th, and it was said that the Emperor would shortly visit that place to superintend the winter Campaign.

The Russian treasury has received large sums of money through Berlin. A fearful tempest had occurred at Sebastopol, with very heavy rains.

On the 17th of September the Turkish troops at Constantinople, intended for Asia, were sent to Eupatoria. Prince Gortschakoff telegraphs, under date 23d September, that the allies had landed 20,000 men at Eupatoria, and had 30,000 on the Russian flank.

On the 22d, the allies attacked the Russian infantry, and the latter retreated to the heights over Rusta. Another despatch from Gortschakoff, dated the 26th, states that on the previous day 23,000 of the allies had debouched from Eupatoria, and occupied the neighboring villages on the left flank.

Gortschakoff reported on the 17th that the allies had attempted nothing up to that date on the north side, but were concentrating their forces between Balakava and the Tchurnaya, and constantly reconnoitering the left wing of the Russians from the Baidir valley.

The loss of the Russians is estimated at eighteen thousand men. Despatches from Sebastopol, of the 16th, announce that the Russians were fortifying themselves in the north part, and were constructing new batteries; and that the French were advancing cavalry and a column of infantry toward Backscharai by the Baidir road. Sebastopol is to be razed and the bastion filled up.

Letters from the camp mention that the allies were actively preparing for a campaign. A letter from Berlin, dated the 23d, says: Various circumstances at St. Petersburg seem to indicate that Prince Gortschakoff will soon evacuate the forts to the north of Sebastopol, those forts being only strategic points, but great preparations are making by the Russians for a winter campaign.

From three to four hundred deserters, most of them Poles, had arrived at the allied camp. They stated that the demoralization of the Russian army was most complete, and that such was the confusion from the first moment of the attack, that the soldiers exhausted with fatigue, remained for twenty-four hours without provisions.

THE WAR IN ASIA.—Vienna despatches say that Kars was greatly strengthened by provisions, and that the garrison was eating horse flesh. Advances from Trebizond, dated 6th September, announce that the Russians had abandoned Erzeroum and were at Palagueloua.

Milligan, Evans & Co., quote French stocks as having slightly advanced. A Guano Company has been formed in New York, with a capital of \$1,000,000. They profess to own an island in the Pacific, covered with a deposit of over 250,000,000 tons of ammoniacal guano, and to have despatched a ship to take possession of it. They further say, they expect to sell the first year 400,000 tons, at \$30 a ton, out of which they will realize a profit of \$2,400,000. These expectations, however, are yet to be realized.

TURNING THE TABLES.—The Central Ohio Railroad Company has commenced suit against the owners of the cattle by which a train was thrown from the track with considerable injury some time ago, with a view to recover damages for the same. The Company also signifies its intention to pursue the same course in similar cases hereafter.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 10.—The Democrats of this city concede the election of Salmon P. Chase, the Republican candidate for Governor. His majority will be about 10,000, although several thousands were thrown away on Trimble, Whig.
