From Philadelphia.

News Items from Other Counties.

PERRY.—The Bloomfield papers announce the death of Rev. John Dickey, of the Presbyterian Church. There was an auto de fe at Bloomfield just after the election, but a difference of opinion as to who was burnt. Some say it was "Sam," with the jug law on his back, leading a big K N along disguised as a Narrow Hat.

BLAIR.—A man named Parsons attempted to arrest a colored man, said to be a slave, named Green, at Hollidaysburg on Saturday week, but was foiled in the attempt by Gen. Potts, Col. Piper, and Maj. Crawford. Parsons was bound over to answer for an attempt to kidnap, and in the meantime the darkey made tracks for parts unknown.

LUZERNE.—They are getting up gas works in Wilkes-Barre. A prospectus is out for a Democratic paper in Pittston. The Lancaster Herald says: The work on the different lines of railroads leading out of this place, north, south, and east, is rapidly progressing.

BRADFORD.—Dr. M'Intosh, who has some reputation for pulling teeth and pulping trout, proposes to issue a dollar volume entitled "Fish and Philosophy," or sketches of nature and history up Bradford county-way, and more especially on the Schuylkill branch of the Towanda creek.

NORTHUMBERLAND.—Court commences at Sunbury on Monday next. Coal township now contains 1540 inhabitants, a gain of over 1000 in two years. Proposals will be received until the 19th inst. for the erection of a new Methodist Episcopal house of worship in Northumberland.

GEN. Wm. Cullom of Tennessee is named for next Clerk of the lower house of Congress. He voted against the Nebraska bill, and lost his re-election by that vote.

Over two weeks have passed since a man named Winchester left Norfolk, Ohio, in a balloon, since which he has not been heard of. It is feared he was perished.

GEN. Carronfort has been elected President of Mexico, Gen. Alvarez having resigned.

Santa Anna has gone to the island of St. Thomas, with his daughter and a numerous suite. It is now positively stated that the Administration will give Gen. Scott the back pay evidently intended by Congress in the bill creating him a Lieutenant General.

Wm. Case, the oldest Wesleyan clergyman in Canada, died at Alnwick, Canada West, last week, at the age of 75 years. A few weeks since Mr. Case fell from his horse, and broke one of his legs. This accident was the immediate cause of his death.

On the 17th instant a public celebration, took place in New Orleans for the fall of Sevastopol. A te deum was chanted at the Cathedral, and a salute of three hundred guns fired.

Ten conductors and five brakemen on the New York Central Railroad have been detected and punished for stealing various packages, extending some time back.
