Fire in Millburg. We are informed that a fire in Millburg yesterday morning consumed the Hotel occupied by Mr. Cummings, with other adjoining buildings. Cyrus Eaton's house was also entirely consumed, and those occupied by J. M. Bowers and Mrs. Steeg, and Hissong's store, were much damaged, but not totally destroyed. Cummings' and Eaton's losses are partly covered by insurance. The origin of the fire is unknown. Alex. Cummings was severely burned, and suffers intensely.
