Election in Vermont. BURLINGTON, Sept. 3--The success of the Republicans yesterday has been overwhelming. The following is the State ticket elected for the ensuing year:--Governor--Ryland Fitcher, Lieut. Governor--James M. Glada, Treasurer--H. M. Bates.

There was no Fillmore ticket in the field, and that run by the Democrats received but a small vote. The new Congressional delegation are all Republicans as follows:--First District--E. P. Walton, Second District--J. S. Morrill, Third District--Henry E. Royce. The Legislature is more than three-fourths Republican. Republican majority, 20,000.
