The undersigned now call upon all who are opposed to slavery extension over free territory—to the increase of slave representation in the Federal Government, and to the Cincinnati platform and its candidates—and upon all who desire the peace and the honor of the country, and faithfully to the constitutional rights of every section of it, to cooperate with them in this contest for Union, Liberty and Justice!

We solemnly invoke their active and earnest efforts to overthrow that sectional organization which seeks to force slavery upon a free people at the point of the sword, and degrade American citizenship by vitiating its safeguards at the ballot box.

The undersigned have appointed a committee to prepare an address for the people, which will be published in a few days.

We are happy to announce that entire unanimity existed in the proceedings of two committees, and no doubt is entertained that the result of our common efforts to secure the adoption of the Union electoral tickets now presented, will be hailed with satisfaction by every citizen of Pennsylvania, who is honestly hostile to the Cincinnati Platform and the election of James Buchanan as the President.

Union Convention.

HARRISBURG, Oct. 21.—The Union State Convention, called for the purpose of forming an anti-Buchanan Electoral ticket, met at 2 o'clock in the hall of the House of Representatives. The attendance is large, most of the counties being represented by double delegations.

of Philadelphia have also resolved to support the Union Electoral Ticket headed by the name JOHN C. FREMONT.

On motion, Wm. M. Baird, of Berks, was appointed temporary President, and Messrs. Hill, of Blair, and Lawrence, of Dauphin, appointed Secretaries.

A Committee of one delegate from each Senatorial District was then appointed to report permanent officers for the Convention. During the absence of the Committee, on motion, the address of the Hon. Charles Gibbons, exposing the course of John P. Sanderson, Chairman of the American State Committee, in relation to a Union electoral ticket, was read for the information of the Convention. Those parts of the address referring to Mr. Sanderson's communications from Col. Forsay, and his request for the "side door" interview, were received with much feeling, and at the conclusion of the reading of the address there was great applause.

Despatches were received and read from Allentown, pledging the delegates from Lehigh to a fusion electoral ticket, and also from Philadelphia, announcing the intention of the American party to denounce and repudiate Mr. Sanderson. These despatches were read amid great excitement and cheers.

The Committee on Permanent Officers reported the Hon. Lemuel Todd, of Cumberland, for President, with a full list of Vice Presidents and Secretaries. The nominations were unanimously endorsed by the Convention, and Mr. Todd, on taking the chair, made a brief and eloquent speech. A committee of one from each Congressional district was then appointed, to name an Electoral Ticket. After some time the committee returned and reported to the Convention the ticket agreed upon by the Union Committee on Friday last, which was unanimously ratified by the Convention. A resolution was then adopted, pledging the Convention to the support of the ticket, on the basis heretofore published, of the division of the vote of the electoral college in proportion to the number of popular votes received by Fillmore and Fremont respectively. A committee was then appointed, of which the President of the Convention was made chairman, to prepare a brief address to the people of the State, with authority to sign the names of the members of the Convention.

On motion, the Convention then adjourned, after nine cheers for the ticket. The closing scenes were very exciting.

Ratification Meeting.

HARRISBURG, Oct. 21.—There was a Union Mass Meeting held this evening, in the Court-house, to endorse the Union Electoral Ticket formed to-day. The Court-house was crowded. Wm. Mitchell was chosen to preside, and a committee of three was appointed to wait on Gov. Pollock, and request him to address the meeting. After a short time the Governor appeared, and delivered a brief and stirring speech, urging all his friends to unite in hearty support of the ticket formed.

Hon. Lemuel Todd followed in an eloquent appeal. He owned a preference for Mr. Fillmore, and implored his American friends to unite upon the ticket, and defeat ten cent Jimmy and the slavery-extending Democrats.

Hon. Charles B. Penrose proceeded in a more elaborate effort of the same tendency.

The meeting adjourned at a late hour, amid great good feeling.

Affairs in Kansas.

The reign of legal tyranny in Kansas is now complete. The last outrage of Gov. Geary, as reported by telegraph, is in harmony with the system which he has pursued from the beginning. He began by imprisoning the free State citizens, and he has now one hundred and thirteen of them in the custody of his Missouri body-guard. His next proceeding was to drive out all the active public men belonging to the free State party, so as to prevent the possibility of its re-organization. To this end, he expelled General Lane with one hundred and fifty settlers, who had been compelled to arm themselves for protection against the Southern army of invasion. They were hunted beyond the border by United States dragoons. The next step was effectually to close up the Territory against all emigrants from the free States, which was done by a cordon of Missouri rangers drawn from the southwest corner of Iowa to the Arkansas line.

But the last outrage is the most insolent and atrocious than anything which had been before attempted. Gov. Geary has thrown off the mask, and is now openly using the army of the United States to arrest, plunder and imprison a large body of peaceful emigrants from the free States, with their wives and children. We have accounts from St. Louis and Chicago, the centres of pro-slavery and anti-slavery opinion, and they substantially agree as to the facts!

Our private information from Harrisburg and Philadelphia, is, that we can do better, in nearly every county, on President, than on the State Ticket. There are a few ultra Fillmore men, and some ultra Fremont men, who oppose the Union Electoral Ticket, (and the Buchanan men are both secretly and openly encouraging their ruinous course;) but the great, honest masses of each wing are determined to sustain it as a fair, honorable, wise, and almost certain means of carrying the State and defeating Buchanan.

We had an opportunity on Monday and Tuesday of seeing a large number of the friends of Mr. Fillmore, from various parts of the county. Without a single exception they were favorable to the Union electoral ticket recently formed; and reported the Fillmore men of their respective districts as unanimously in favor of union. Up to this time we can hear of but two individuals professing to be Fillmore men who oppose the union ticket, and they both reside in the city. Of course everybody understands that they are both in reality Buchanan men.—Lancaster Examiner.
