Hon. CHARLES BLINDE PENROSE, Senator from Philadelphia, died suddenly in Harrisburg, of pleurisy, on Monday last, aged 60 years. He was a highly talented and respected man, and member of the bar. The last death of a Senator while that body was in session, was 18 years ago, when Jacob Cassett, Mr. Penrose's colleague, expired, and Mr. Penrose himself announced his death.

The Commissioners' Office for Union county is removed to their new Rooms in the Court House. The Prothonotary and Register and Recorder expect to follow suit early next week. They have commodious apartments, with safes and pigeon holes enough to keep papers for half a century to come. Both those Territories are practically given up to lawless and crime, although nominally governed by U. S. officers, who draw their pay from the "national" Treasury.
