Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met. That the following amendments are proposed to the Owstitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the profisions of the tenth article thereof.

ARTICLE 31.

OF PUBLIC DEETY.

Section 1.
