NARROW ESCAPE--On Tuesday afternoon of last week, two children, a son and daughter of Rev. John Gwyer, of Bellefonte, were playing together in rooms occupied at the time by the family, and in their amusement the little girl endeavored to pass into the room occupied by her brother, a lad some eight or ten years of age. The boy prevented his sister's ingress by closing the door, and thinking to frighten her, seized a gun which he supposed unloaded, and fired it off for that purpose. The gun however being loaded with shot, several of them passed through the door and lodged in the side of her neck and head. The shot were extracted by Dr. Fairbank, and the wounds though severe, we understand are not considered dangerous.

Gunter (a Governor of the Alms-house) have been expelled from Tammany, for the same reason. By the time they are all kicked out of the Democrat ranks, the opposition will carry New York again.
