The ice passed out of the Susquehanna, last week, and Rafts are this week passing down in considerable numbers. The Williamsport Gazette says the Canal is to be opened this week.

ORDINATION.—Mr. H. B. Johnson, late a student of the University in Lewisburg, was ordained to the work of the ministry at Knoxville, Ill., on the 24th of this month, and has settled as the pastor of the Baptist church in that city.

Independent Hall was crumpled last week to hear Mr. ATKINS, who realized over \$30 clear from the effort. He is no doubt very grateful for this handsome voluntary offering of his friends to their favorite secular teacher.

Dr. A. P. MEYER is about to remove to this town. He is a native of New York, and has been a member of the medical profession in that State for many years. He is a student of the University in Lewisburg, and studied medicine at the first school in New York, from whence he brings the best testimonials from the most eminent men of the profession.

Mr. WITMER presented in Assembly the petition of Phillip, John, and Christopher Seebald, for an act to change their trial of question for the County property at New Berlin, to another county; and read a bill in place to remove it to Northumberland county.

Mr. Hayes presented petitions of citizens of Union county to prohibit the hunting of deer with dogs.

The committee to whom was presented petitions for abolishing the County Superintendency in Union county, have asked to be discharged, which we suppose ends the matter.—Gov. Foster, and the Legislature of Pennsylvania take no backward step in the cause of universal education.

The following Bills passed first reading in the House: An act to incorporate the Lewisburg Building Association.

An act in relation to the ferry at Shamokin dam.

The bill before the Legislature, to lay a tax of \$2,000 upon the people of Lewisburg for Court House purposes, we have (since our last) been informed, is to be laid on some of the late Council, which attempted to impose that additional burden.

We have stated all the information we possess upon the subject, believing it to be our duty, towards those who confide in us, to give the people information—not hiding it from them—on subjects that intimately concern their interests, rights, and feelings. Those who think they could not and should not bear this infliction, will do well to make their wishes known to the Council and the Legislature at once. If our people tamely submit to this, they need not complain if they find the \$50,000 Water Tax imposed upon them some day by the same means.—Fair warning: we have done our duty, without fear or malice, favor or ill-will."

There was hardly any contest at our Borough Election last Friday, the "great, national, conservative, victorious, undying Democratic party" not making any organized effort for even an Inspector. (What a change from '30, '36, '40, and even '42 years ago!) The whole Republican nominated ticket was elected by from 200 to 300 majority. There were 184 votes polled in the North Ward—we knew not how many in the South. Two Republican Inspectors were elected in the South Ward, one Republican and one Free Kan. Democrat in the North. Three men who voted for Buchanan were run for Inspectors in the North Ward, with the following result:

Several Democratic papers are down on the appointment of Geo. M. Lamm, as four inspector for Philadelphia. The objections are that he is Anti-Lecompton and is rich.

The Lysening Gazette says the West Branch Bank has been removed to the new home now building erected for it, one door north of the old banking rooms.

The Legislature have reported a resolution for a final adjournment on the 23d of April.
