DANIEL WEIDENSAUL, recently of Hartley township, has taken the Hotel formerly kept by Mr. Showers, in Centreville, Snyder county.

General Pellissier has been appointed French Ambassador to England. The state of France continues to be that of agitation and not of quiet or hope.—The siege of Canton has been raised.

A "Dr. Max Percy," a German recently come to this country, took a horse and buggy from Danville early this week, and it is feared with a felonious intent. His pursuers found he had crossed the Lewisburg Bridge, and then lost track of him. A reward is offered for his apprehension.

Among the members of the Kansas Constitutional Convention, we observe the name of R. M. Fisk, a graduate of the University at Lewisburg, and late a Professor at Burlington, Ia. While with us, Mr. F. was a radical Democrat, but he could not stand the utter prostitution of the party to the propagation of Slavery.

Two young men have been taken up at Millburg (one a stage driver) and sent to jail at Lewisburg, on charge of rifling a carpet bag, which had been left in a hotel at Millburg by John V. Barber. Another youth was also in, on a charge of a petty larceny in Kelly township.—A bad state of affairs among our rising population.

Thursday P. M. last week, the roof of the building in which is Yoder's Jewelry Store, on Market St., Lewisburg, caught fire from a burning chimney, but it was speedily discovered and the flames extinguished, or a disastrous conflagration must have ensued. The building has been recently acquired and was in possession of John B. Linn, Esq.

Hon. James Pollock is elected a School Director in Milton—not quite so well paying an office as Governor, but very important. Gen. Washington served as Grand Juror before President. Ex-Gov. Ritter is often found promoting the interests of common schools in Cumberland county.

There is now no open Slavery Party in Kansas. Their leaders are mostly expelled—vamosed!—at Washington—or cowed by public opinion. Their only hope for Slavery is by the Enslaving Constitution, backed up by U. S. Troops, and by divisions among the Free State men. In the mean time, Free State emigrants are pouring in. Gov. Denver does not attempt to enforce the obnoxious laws, and the people have the moral power to govern themselves as well as any people on earth.

The grounds of the Presbyterian church in this place have been graded and very liberally endowed with shade trees, the past week. —There is yet time to transplant Shade and Fruit Trees, if done thoroughly and carefully. Mr. Linn and Mr. Ludwig, on the Turnpike just west of town, have each a handsome assortment of trees of various kinds. In buying of them, you are quite sure of getting what you buy for, and also that their trees, having been partially or wholly raised here, are best adapted to our soil.

Rev. Mr. Mann's lecture was an entertaining and instructive series of illustrations of the effects of Habit, not only in the animal creation, but especially in Man, mentally, morally, and physically. His contrasts of good and bad habits, were striking and well worthy of the deepest consideration by those whose habits are yet easily moulded.

Williamsport, April 7.—A very destructive fire broke out about half-past three this morning, which entirely consumed the large brick building of Ralph Elliott, occupied as store rooms by J. H. Fulmer and E. V. V. Higgins. A house of R. Faries, occupied by H. Council, was also consumed. Elliott's loss is est. at \$14,000, of which \$5,000 is covered by insurance. Fulmer's loss \$18,000, insured for \$13,000. Higgins' loss \$1 to \$3,000. Faries' loss \$1,000. The property of Updegraff & Winegard and of Jacobs was saved by the utmost exertions. Joseph Wonderly and George Gold, who slept over the store, barely escaped—they were taken up by means of a ladder. Fulmer's store was the largest in the town. The whole loss is estimated at \$10,000, of which over one-half is covered by insurance. There are suspicions that the fire was caused intentionally.

Williamsport, April 8.—A young man by the name of Henry Ritzy was drenched in a boat which took fire at night, at Montoursville. He had been asleep in the cabin, and his body was burned to a crisp.

Some fine salmon were caught by Dr. Leonard, last week, just below Lewisburg dam; some of them weighed twelve pounds.—Agnes.

Remonstrance Proposed.

Messrs. Editors.—It appears that the Messrs. Scobell are not content with the profits that accrued to their family during the forty years after the removal of the county seat from Millburg to New Berlin. They now attempt to get back to themselves the land that their father sold, with all its improvements. These belong to the two counties, and are worth three thousand dollars. These heirs are not content to try title in this county, where all the circumstances are familiar to the people. But a similar attempt in the case of heirs of M'Fadden against Insurance Company, which undertook to have the trial elsewhere, was denied by the Legislature. It is time that the tax-payers of Union county were up and doing, and remonstrate against this piece of injustice, or suffer great danger of a loss of their own property.

Enon.—The bill which passed the House last week, relating to the change of venue of a certain action from Union to Northumberland county, was the action of Quinn, and not that of Scobell, as stated in our last. The "Legislative Record" did not state what the case was, and we supposed it to be the Scobell application, as it had been made some time since, while that of Quinn had only been made that day. But we are assured by Mr. Hayes that it was the latter case for which a petition was presented, bill read, and passed first, second, and third readings in one day, without any of the usual time for examination or reference to a committee, and contrary to the common and safe practice of legislative bodies. It is by these hurried and forced acts, under excitement, that most of the evil deeds are passed and little tricks accomplished. The Scobell case we are assured is in the hands of the committee. Our correspondent and readers must excuse us for the mistake into which we were led under these circumstances.

Another, who did not want the township of Jackson abolished, says: "If the township was too small, and its maintenance burdensome to the county, then the same argument would apply to the proposed borough of Hartleton, which would have 50 voters, or 20 more than Jackson. Since for the reason is scarce for the number. We all therefore should pray the Court to decline the request, for the Legislature has decided not to have too small election districts."

The bill for the sale of the remainder of the State Canals to the S. & E. Road, passed the House—Mr. Hayes voting in the affirmative.

The bill reducing the prices of licenses, and otherwise facilitating the sale of liquor, passed the House also, mostly by a strict party vote.

The bill relative to public roads in Hartley, Lewis, and West Buffalo, passed the House.

The Appropriation Bill passed the House, and is under consideration in Senate. A Bank Bill is before the House.

ACCIDENT.—Last week, Wednesday afternoon, while Solomon Stroh and William Farnsworth were out shooting pig a short distance above Sunbury, the gun in the hands of Farnsworth was accidentally discharged, and the contents were lodged in the body of Stroh. Fortunately, the part injured was not vital, and the shot was successfully extracted, without any serious damage to Mr. Stroh.

SHOOTING CASE.—Last week, Thursday evening, Michael Farley, an Irishman, was shot a short distance below Sunbury, by a man named Casper Sowers. Sowers says that the Irishman demanded his money—which he had considerable on his person—whereupon he deliberately took aim and shot him in the leg, at a distance of but a few paces. The Irishman denies this story, and asserts that he merely asked him his name. Sowers was arrested and lodged in jail; but was subsequently liberated, by a habeas corpus, on bail of \$1,200. Farley has since been in a dangerous condition. The leg was gangrened, and will probably have to be amputated, as the only means of saving life. Farley was employed upon the Northern Central Railway.—Sunbury Gazette.

A new Post Office, named Rauch's Gap, has been established in that part of Nippenose Valley lying within Clinton Co.

Rev. Eugenio Kincaid has arrived again at Langson. His news from Ava is that the Burman Emperor is still friendly to him.

John M. C. Ranck, Esq., has removed from Millburg, Union Co., to Middleburg, Snyder Co. Pa.

The two Presbyterian churches in Lancaster have united in one. A Second Presbyterian church has been formed in Pottsville, of which Rev. F. S. Colt, of Bradford county, is pastor.
