Another Rail-Road!

That there will be a Railroad built on the West side of the Susquehanna River, we have not the least doubt. It will commence at the west end of the Sunbury & Erie Railroad bridge, which crosses the West Branch fourteen miles above Lewisburg. It will be located on the west bank of the river to Lewisburg; thence to the east end of Dry Valley, there, taking a westerly direction about four miles, will run to Penns Creek, which will cross and continue on the west side to Sellers-grove, and on this side of the river down to the Junction and Harrisburg, where it will intersect with the Lebanon Valley Road, which is connected with the Reading Road.

The distance of the contemplated road, is about seventy-five miles; and its cost, rolling stock included, is estimated at two million dollars. But, in our opinion, this is too high. The entire route presents almost a dead level, and we believe the cost for grading would not reach eight thousand dollars per mile, amounting in the aggregate, to but little over one million one hundred thousand dollars. The bridge, however, across the Susquehanna, might be estimated at one hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which would bring the cost of the road to some thirteen hundred thousand dollars.

Should this enterprise be consummated—and there is no reason for a doubt—Philadelphia will have a direct line of Railroad to Lake Erie.

The Northern Central road belongs to a Baltimore company, which will naturally resort to every possible expedient to benefit their city through the medium of their road. And it is a fixed fact that the Sunbury and Erie road can not be extended through the mountainous region lying between Sunbury and Pottsville, and which has been abandoned. Therefore, to secure the Lake trade, Philadelphia has but one alternative, and that is to turn its attention to this road and see that it is built. Sixty miles of it would be located through a magnificent and productive region of country which is not yet tapped by any other road. Its travel, and the tonnage of agricultural as well as of mineral products along this route, would be unequalled, by any road of equal distance in the State.

We hope the citizens of Lewisburg and Sellers-grove will the proper effort to procure a Charter, and have a Survey and Draft made to lay before Lebanon Valley and Erie companies and the citizens of Philadelphia. The tonnage and travel of these roads would be greatly increased, while Philadelphia would be benefited to an extent not to be reached in any other enterprise involving the same amount of capital.

We will have more to say on this subject hereafter.—Sellers-grove Democrat.

By the Ordinance of the 5th of July, 1849, the High Constable is directed to make a thorough examination of the streets, alleys, and all other places in the borough where filth or any other nuisance may exist, and give notice of the same to the persons on whom it is found to remove the same, or to cleanse those places within one week from the time of such notice; and if such notice is not complied with, the High Constable shall proceed to remove any such nuisance at the expense of the person or persons on whom the same may be found.

Ordinance of 9th October, 1852. That from and after the publication of this ordinance, no person or persons shall be allowed to put coal ashes or any other description of dirt or nuisance or obstruction of any kind in or upon the gutters or water courses there; and if any person or persons shall hereafter obstruct any of the streets, alleys, gutters or other courses of said borough, such person or persons shall be liable to a fine of not less than one dollar, nor more than five dollars for each offence, and that he shall be the duty of the High Constable to give notice to any person or persons who shall obstruct any of the streets, alleys, gutters, or water courses, to remove such obstructions, within five days from the date of such notice, and if such obstructions are not removed within the time so specified it shall be the duty of the High Constable to remove the same, the cost of such removal and the amount of fine or fines imposed (which shall be determined by the Burgess or Town Council) to be collected from the person or persons so offending.
