THE BRIDGE AND THE STEPS.

The *Bridge and Steps* story is pretty much exploded, and yet it is whispered abroad wherever it is thought a man can be deceived by it. We republish the correspondence on the subject, which is sufficient, one would think, to satisfy any man willing to be convinced:

Lewisburg, Sept. 27, 1858.

Mr. JAMES PROSS, Kelly Township.

Dear Sir.—Having learned that active efforts are being made to injure you by circulating certain false reports. Unite the liberty of looking at your papers in the following points:

1. Have you agreed with any man or men, Delegates to the State Convention, to endeavor to have you elected County Commissioner, and to have a new County Bridge erected over Buffalo Creek at any point opposite or adjoining to your bridge?

2. Do you believe it expedient in every such a Bridge, in the present state of county finances, and would you make any effort, in an official capacity, to favor that project during the session for which you are proposed?

3. Would you, if elected Commissioner, favor the building of steps to the Court House, at the expense of the taxpayers, and, if so, would you enter into a bond and swear that the Board of Health shall be erected over the bridge, whatever may be the cost from his own shoulders?

Nigger? Nigger? NIGGER!—of a very inglorious vanger it was said—Hecklowe on two paces—one of Old Hundred, and the other isn't!—One of our neighbors, the organ grinder of the Augs, it may also be said (judging by his paper)—he seems to have but two ideas—one is Niggerism and the other isn't!

In distressing "original" verse, or hacked-out "nigga" prose, the nightmare of Niggerism weighs upon his burdened mind, and stains his genius with a most sombre, solemn hue. For the defense of Niggerism in its most oppressive and repulsive forms—Oppression and Amalgamation, or Slavery—his mighty powers are taxed from time to time. He is a bold, impudent, impudent scoundrel, who seems to have chiseled the stone of the man with the man's tools. He has should unfortunately lost his reason in his vicious contests with these "powers of darkness," no doubt the cause assigned at the Asylum would be—Ultimate Niggerism—White at that! And if his readers—such is his stupid, everlasting, wishy-washy twaddle about "Niggerism," should allow the Augs to die again some dark day, the verdict of the Coronor's Jury would surely be—Died in the wool, a martyr to its own Niggerism!

In reply to your inquiries, I will say that I never was spoken to by any person or persons concerning my nomination, as suggested, to favor the construction of the Bridge across one of the Court Houses. In the present state of condition of the county, I deem it imprudent for the county to build any bridge or bridges, or expand any more motor or bridge purposes, except to keep them in repair that are already built. In regard to the Court House steps, I think their construction part of the building itself, and conveniently the expense must be borne by the building committee of those who signed the bonds, and not by the county.

If the people of the county should see proper to favor me with their votes sufficient to elect me, I should do what is in my power to retrench and reduce the expense as much as possible.

THE BRIDGE.
