To Tax Payers and Tax-collectors. AS it is generally known that Tax-collectors have to pay interest on the balance due by them at the second Tuesday in January, for the information of all concerned I will cite the law on the subject. (See Purdon's Digest page 791 Sec. 123.) "If the quota of any county be not paid over before the second Tuesday in January in each year in January, for the information of all concerned the amount remaining unpaid shall be charged against said county on the books of the State Treasurer and shall bear an interest of five per cent. till paid, and no payment shall be made to or in behalf of said county under the various acts relating to common schools or any other purpose until the said balance be fully paid and satisfied."
