Foreign News.

The news by the Caledonia from Liverpool and London to Saturday, the 29th of September. It is of comparatively slight interest and importance. The corn trade was dull, and prices had fallen. Cotton was without any marked change. American stocks were in good request. The Queen had left the Highlands on her return to England. Everything in France was quiet. Mr. Rives had arrived at Paris. A Russian officer had arrived at Constantinople, to demand the extradition of the Hungarian refugees. The Pope was still at Naples, but was to leave about the 1st of October for a town in the vicinity of Rome. He had published a decree, accompanied by an amnesty, which had excited great dissatisfaction by the want of liberality which it displays. Everything was quiet at Rome, there was a good deal of irritation in the public mind. The latest news from Hungary states

that Comen had not surrendered, but active measures were on foot for pushing its siege. A correspondent of the Times, who visited the place on the 19th of September, states that 70,000 men were encamped there, and that 260 eighteen and twenty-four pounders were employed in reducing the fortress. The garrison is said to be 26,000 strong, and the number of the citizens is 12,000. Provisions were entirely in the hands of the garrison, and the citizens were compelled to pay 24 for a pound of coffee. Meat was plentiful. Terms had been offered the garrison similar to those granted by Marshall Radetzky to the Venetians: the siege was to commence, if these terms were rejected, on the 21st. The Emperor of Russia has returned to St. Petersburg, and his troops are gradually withdrawing within the Russian frontier. It was reported that Gen. Bem had died of his wounds in Wallachia, but the rumor lacked confirmation. The Cholera was rapidly on the decline in England.

The California News.

We give in to day's issue copious details from our Pacific files, received by the Empire City. They will be found to be of highly interesting character. In regard to the Gold product, the accounts are as favorable as could be expected, and more so than those by the last arrival. The waters were lower, and the hard labor of the miners appears to be well rewarded. The mist of exaggeration is being gradually cleared away, and the true position of affairs in California can now be more easily ascertained. It is evident that the supply of gold in the auriferous deposits, although inexhaustible, is very extensive, and that hard labor in the dry and wet diggings is well repaid. Fortunes are not found in every pocket, and, as in all lands, some are unfortunate or unlucky.

The movement towards the formation of a State Constitution is proceeding, and a decidedly Anti-Slavery spirit is manifested throughout. The troubles anticipated with the Chilians and other foreigners do not seem to have been experienced, and the removal of these "outside barbarians" from the diggings has been, partially at least, accomplished without resort to actual violence.

The precautionary measures taken by Gen. Smith for the relief of the overland emigrants will meet with warm commendation from all quarters. A very large number of arrivals, it will be noticed, had taken place at San Francisco, from the Atlantic cities, disembarking an immense number of pilgrims to the Sacramento and the American Fork. The Shipping List in our paper of to-day will be read with eager interest by thousands of the relatives and friends of these pilgrims.

The indications of a high regard for law and order among the respectable portion of the citizens of California are confirmed by this arrival, and those dissolute characters who have flocked to the Pacific expecting immunity for all their crimes, meet a more stringent justice than they left a home.--N.Y. Tribune.

By actual count of Coin in Bank in New York a few days ago, the count was \$3,030,000, which, with the amount in the Sub-Treasury, gives over eleven millions and a half of dollars in the City, considerably above the average amount. This amount, with the continual receipts from California during the winter, and the absence of apprehension of a shipment of Specie to Europe, must keep the money market easy.

The Territorial Courts of Minnesota have just been opened. Twenty attorneys were admitted to practice, which certainly will be thought a sufficient number for a population of no more than five thousand.

Hon. Andrew Stewart of Pa. has (it is stated) been appointed Minister to Brazil, in place of Maj. Thomas W. Chinn, who returns on account of ill health.

Gamble has about 15,000 majority. The Democrats have 1 majority in the Senate, and enough Dem. maj. in the House to repeal all the "terrible Laws."

They just last winter, without the aid of Maj. Cummings. We hope to give complete or official returns from the whole State, next week.

Potatoes are said to be somewhat scarce and small this year, but we doubt it. Mr. Thomas Reber sends us one of a round shape, fat cheeks, laughing eyes, a pound and a half, not how much, in weight, which he doubtless considers a Democratic production--and yet we guess some of the Whigs can show a bigger one if they can't crow over Gamble.

We have not received the Official Election Returns from Junius. Those of Union county are inserted above. It will be seen that the average Whig majority is smaller than common, and the Democratic vote larger. The change is principally in the south river townships. The Independent candidates ran well, and if they had only advertised in the only Independent paper, who knows but they might have been elected?

Mr. Davis lectured last week three evenings in the Baptist church on Babylon, Egypt, &c., to audiences not half the size a subject of that nature should draw. The exhibition is a perfectly unexceptionable one, and we are not how any mind of ordinary intelligence could fail of giving it deep attention. We can cheerfully commend the lecturer as a man worthy of public confidence and patronage, and his lectures are well calculated to awaken interest, to instruct, and by the impressive lessons they teach, to favorably impress the mind and the heart of every one.

Fatal Accident.--The York Press states that Jesse Sherman, of Codorus township, met with an accident which resulted in his death. He was attending his saw mill, and whilst thus engaged, his coat skirts became entangled in the wheel, and his body was drawn in, and so terribly crushed that before assistance could be rendered he was deprived of life.

We have authority for saying that the President will probably not find it possible to resume and complete the Northern Tour, which was so suddenly interrupted by his illness at Erie. His health is not yet fully restored, and the pressure of public business will render it difficult for him to leave Washington this Fall.

The New York Globe remarks, in view of the apparent Democratic union in that State: "The only epidemic now in our city, is the Democratic grip. It is extending in every direction, and bids fair to knock the Whigs into a collapse early in November."

The Corn Crop.--The Hagerstown Pledge says: "Many of the farmers in this region are very agreeably surprised to find that the corn crops are much better than they expected, considering the great dryness of the season."

Pra. Taylor left Washington on Wednesday to attend the Agricultural Fair and Cattle Show near Baltimore. He designed returning to Washington in a day or two, and would not extend his visit further North at present.

Joseph C. Powell, Whig, is elected to the Legislature from Bradford county. This is the first Whig sent from Bradford since Gen. Elihu Case and Col. George Kinney were elected, in 1837. Mr. Powell is one of the first settlers of Bradford.

The editor of the Whig paper in Junonia is a philosopher as well as an aid-camp to the Governor. Col. McClure reports after the battle as follows:

"THE RESULT.--All we have to say, went take much space. The entire Loco county ticket is elected, by majorities large enough for both practicable and general purposes. We did think at first of complaining of some of our Whig townships, but when they all came in we found that we would have to 'lick the whole school'--so we just stopped short. The matter of crowing, and other little luxuries incident to elections, we respectfully decline, hoping that our neighbor up the way will do them ample justice."
