WE are indebted to Gen. W. W. H. Davis, editor of the Doylestown *Democrat*, for a copy of the history of the 10th Regiment, of which he is the author. THE signing of the bill which repeals the license law of 1867, virtually renewes the law known as the "Bucklaw Law," which punishes "selling" on Sunday with a fine of five dollars and costs. The argument in the Senate, when this repealing law passed, was founded on the legal maxim that when a law which repealed another itself is repealed, the first statute is thereby revived without any formal words for that purpose. Hence, the Bucklaw Law, being the former statute, is revived by the repeal of the license law of 1867.
