THE CORN GRUE.-The corn crop has several formidable enemies to contend with and among them is what is commonly called the white grub whick, damages the crop seriously, perhaps the best remedy ever ASHES, BEESWAN, BEANS, suggested, is the application of salt as soon as the plant makes its appearance above the ground. Take one part common salt and three parts plaster of gypsum, and apply about a full tablespoonful around each hill, and it will be found to be a sure protection. The moisture should not come in contact with the sprouts, as it may desistor them. This method has been tried over and over again'by some of the best famors Sorghum, Molasses, &c., &c., of Pennsylvania, Delaware, and Jersey, and when applied propperly has never failed to be perfectly successful. We hope our farmers, who have reason I to fear the depredations of the grub this season will try the mixture, leaving a few alternate rows of corn without the salt, and communicate in transl in the United States. us the result. We are aware some writers say salt has no effect upon vermin, but we speak in this matter on the best authority.

AGRICULTURAL SCHOOLS, - Agricultural education is more popular in Europe than in this country, and the system of schools in this country, and the system of schools seems to be preferred to that of colloges.—
Russia has sixty-eight Agricultural schools and colleges, one of which has three thousand acres attached. In France there are seventy farm schools, besides colleges, three veterinary institutions, together with an expenditure of over \$100,000 for the encour agement of agriculture in other ways. In Belgium there are one hundred such such institutions, and agriculture is the most fashionable calling in the kingdom. In Saxony there are five agricultural institutions, in Bavaria thirty-three, in Prussia thirty-two, in Scotland two, in Ireland sixty-three, and several in England.

Passenviha Foos. - A fresh egg fills the shell and will not make a naise when shaken. In a short time a Sportion of the albumen will escape transpiration-a partial vacuum will be created, and the value of the egg become diminished [rapidly till it] becomes rotten. If the air could be wholely excluded from the meat of the egg it woul remain in an eatable estate for years. The best ordinary preservative is to place the egg in lime, apex downward, and fill the crock or tub with water. In this they will keep quite well for months.

PRUNING ROSES.—The past winter was very hard upon the rose busheo. In pruning them it should be done with a liberal hand. There need be no fear of injary .-Nothing stands pruning better than the rose, and we think it is a benefit to it to be killed down to the ground every two or three year! Therefore, when any consindrable dead portion appears, but nearly down to the ground, and it will give vigor to the root and new shoots, and the flowers be much finer.

Sconered Linen.-The following will restore scorehed linen:-Peel and slice two onions, and extract the juice by pounding and squeezing; add half an ounce of shred white soap, two ounces of fuller's earth and half'a pint of vinegar; boil together, and when cool spread it over the scorched linen,

one egg and beat it up, and and teaspoonful of salt, pour in about two thirds of a pint of water, then slice some bread, dip it in and fry in a little butter; cerve warm.
