How to Measure Hay in Mows .- The editor of the New Jersey Farmer says that he has proved the following rule for finding the number of tons of hay in a given bulk : "Take a mow of 12 or 15 feet in depth, and which has been filled with hay as it was drawn from the field, and has been lying till spring, and measure the length, breadth and height in feet; multiply them to get the cubical contents. For instance: the length is 20 feet, breadth 40 feet, and height 16 feet; 20 times 40 makes 800, multiplied by 16, equal to 12,800 cubic feet, which, being divided by 700, the number of feet that make a ton of 2,000 pounds, will give 18 tons 200 pounds. The top of the mow, say ton, the middle 700 feet, and the bottom of the mow at 600; so the whole bulk would average 700 feet, if the mow is 12 on 15 feet

The article now offered is a wrought iron plow point fitting into a hollow square, of the economy of which wonderful tales are told. Those that have got bitten find wrought iron points cost more apiece than shares of cast iron. As these plow point swindlers are understood to be making a hurried sweep through the State, farmers would do well to be on the alert for them. Papers desirous of saving their patrons' pockets, will direct attention to this swindling scheme. It has cost the farmers in the western part of the State about \$200,000

How to Make Tomato VINEGAR.—The following receipt for the manufacture of tomato vinegar is given by the agricultural editor of the Desmoines (Iowa) National Platform. It is simple enough to be easily tried at the proper time:

"Take one bushel of ripe tomatoes, wash them in an open tub, and add one quart of molasses that weighs eleven pounds to the gallon, and thoroughly mix the whole together, in which condition let the tub stand several days, not neglecting to frequently stir the mixture in it. When a decided vinegar odor is given off, the juice should be strained from the pomace and put into casks, and let stand until the process is completed. Vinegar thus made is equal to the best, and to succeed in its manufacture only requires faithfully following out these directions."

An experiment, made last year in Germany in planting potatoes, showed that where the "eyes" had first been removed. the yield was four times as great as where they were left in their place. It was found that where an old eye had been rubbed off, three or four new ones made their appear-
